

SARAZEN AND SMITH TIED FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

METROPOLITAN OPEN GOLF TITLE TAKES OVERTIME

Stars Have Played 108 Holes Without Decisive Result—Normally Takes Only 72

NEW YORK, July 18.—The Metropolitan Open Golf Championship, scheduled at 72 holes of medal play in two days, already has required 108 holes and three days, and remains in the balance. Gene Sarazen, who won the open at Stoke, 1925, and MacDonald Smith, the Scot who captured the Western and Long Island open titles last year with scores of 281, are arrayed against each other in a record making duel.

ZACHARY SHUTS OUT NEW YORK GIANTS

First Time League Leaders Have Been Blanked This Year—Other Results

NEW YORK, July 18.—Tom Zachary, 30-year-old left hander of the St. Louis Browns and formerly of the Washington Senators, may well claim something of a feat in this baseball year of many feats for he is the first to shut out the New York Yankees of 1926.

The lean moundman from Snow Camp, N. C., permitted the slugging Huggins team to hit safely nine times yesterday, his veteran head turned them back when trouble threatened. He struck out four, Lazear proving a victim thrice. St. Louis won, four to nothing, Williams hitting a home that sent Jones to the showers.

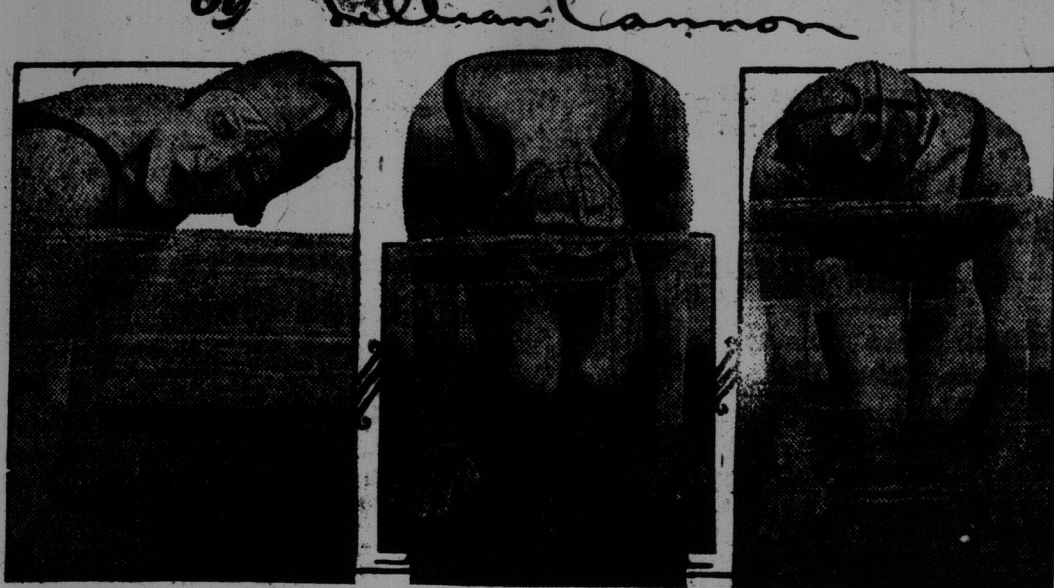
