James Aikins at the time when Sir Hugh Macdonald was premier of the province, and is often referred to as the "Macdonald act." Around this piece of legislation has raged the controversy of the past seven years.

Passed by the legislature of 1900, the act was expected to come into force a year later. In the meantime, however, it was referred to the Manitoba court of appeal which rendered a decision declaring the legislation ultra vires. This judgment was followed by an appeal to the privy council where the legislation was proclaimed quite within the competence of the province.

In the meantime Sir Hugh John Macdonald had resigned as head of the Government in Manitoba, his place being taken by R. P. Roblin. The administration then took the position that they were not committed to the Manitoba Temperance act and decided to refer the question to another vote of the electorate. On this occasion the vote issued, for—15,607; against—22,464, giving a majority against the temperance act of 6,857. This is the only occasion on which the province recorded a majority against prohibition.

For a time the controversy waned,

when the desired temperance restrictions. The Macdonald act was recommended by the council as the best instrument for the purpose. The referent dum was held on the advisability of enforcing this act, the vote being, for, 50,484, against, 26,502, or a majority for prohibition of 23,982. Thus endorsed by the electorate the act came into force on June 1, 1916.


