SAYS U.S. LOST WORLD CREDIT
H. W. Stead Speaks of Repudiating Versailles Treaty.
Declares Greatest Feature of Washington Conference is That it Represents Attempt of U. S. to Rectify Matter.

(Canadian Press.)
New York, Dec. 5.—H. W. Stead, editor of the London Times, declared in a speech before the Canadian Club on Saturday that the United States had lost credit throughout the world by "repudiating the Versailles treaty" and "dishonoring the signature of its legal representative."

"We had to take President Wilson at his face value," Mr. Stead said, "which at that time was far from being his true value."
"Nations, like individuals, cannot go back on their signatures without losing credit, and the sad truth is that in the repudiation of the Versailles treaty the U. S. people lost credit throughout the world. When 110,000,000 sturdy, intelligent, honest people lose their credit, it is a calamity. When those people speak English and share in general the ideal of allegiance to the same kind of laws, and believe the same things are worth while that other English speaking nations believe, the calamity is doubled."

Mr. Stead asserted that for the U. S. to dishonor the signature of its legal representative in Europe was "one of the most flagrant crimes in the moral history of the world."
