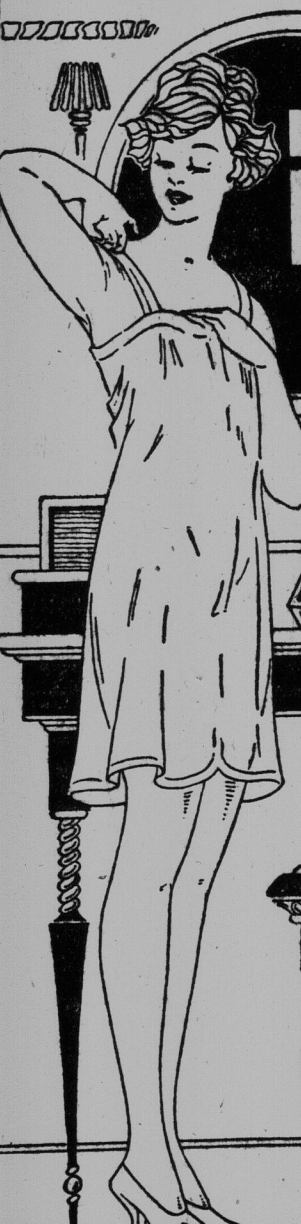

MATTERS BEFORE DIOCESAN SYNOD

Several important matters were considered at the afternoon session of the Anglican Diocesan Synod at Fredericton yesterday.
The report of the synod representative on the Maritime home for girls was received and adopted. The home is located at Truro. There are at present sixty-eight girls in the home, twenty-one being from New Brunswick. The financial condition is most flourishing. The income for maintenance has more than equalled expenditures. The training is thorough in school work, sewing, laundry and domestic science. Light, healthful outside work is carried on the needs of the home. The diocese of Fredericton is however behind in its payments to this institution to the extent of \$2,000.

The order of business was suspended and a motion passed that the nomination for the election of officers to the provincial synod be held at that session and that the balloting take place on Thursday morning. Upon the motion of Canon Smithers the synod gave an expression of the deep loss which the church had suffered in the death of the late Hon. Charles J. Oman, of Hillsboro.

Motion by Father Young.
The following motion, introduced by Rev. J. V. Young and seconded by Canon A. Macdonald, was adopted unanimously: "Whereas, the situation of the Maritime Home for Women (at Moncton) has altered since the last synod the four denominations, viz., Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptist and Church of England, were united; be it resolved, that this synod affirm its willingness to contribute the same proportion of support as last year, and that the bishop appoint three men to act for the time being on the committee."

STATESMEN OF CANADA TALK TO THE EDITORS

Montreal, May 4.—Sir Lomer Gouin, minister of justice, and Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, voiced their views on the powers and responsibilities of the press at a convention banquet of the Canadian Daily Newspapers Association at the Windsor last night.

Sir Lomer urged the opportunity of brushing away inter-provincial and inter-

territorial bickerings and jealousies while Mr. Meighen dwelt on the international situation and the power of the press to help to straighten this out, and expressed the opinion that the press was not doing its best to help leading statesmen of the world to solve the immense problems of the day. A telegram of regret at inability to attend was read from the premier.

J. H. Woods of Calgary, responding to the toast of Present Day Problems, said that Canada could handle all her material problems, but the most important were ethical, and among the latter was the problem of east and west and he urged editors to restrain themselves in making reflections on other parts of the dominion.

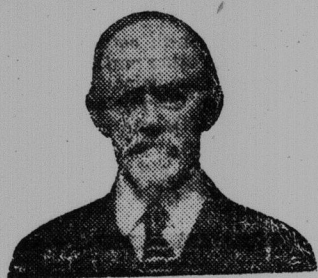
