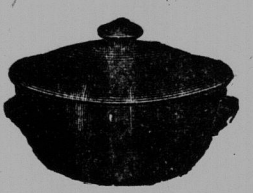

ST. JOHN MAN'S INVENTION A WINNER

New System for Treating Auto Tops, Perfected by Bernard Dunn.

It has just been learned that the Locomobile and Packard System of treating automobile tops, painting, dyeing and finishing with a waterproof, yet pliable surface, is the invention of a St. John man.

Mr. Bernard Dunn, the inventor, has been at the automobile painting business for over seventeen years, and the result of his years of labor and study is

worthy of the attention of the automobile world. Already it has been introduced throughout the United States from the headquarters there, New York and Chicago.

Mr. Dunn, himself, is now in this city, and intends to make St. John his home for some time. In addition to living here, Mr. Dunn will use St. John as distributing centre and hub for introducing this big success in Canada.

He has already established quarters on City Road, to handle all sorts of contracts on automobile painting, where his own personal service will make it greatly to the autoists' advantage to visit.

Although fuller details of his invention are not yet obtainable, it is understood to be an inexpensive method of renewing auto tops, to a degree almost better than the original article when manufactured. Both businesses will be carried on together, at the City Road plant.
