### BISMARCK FORESAW GERMANY'S END

Said That The Empire Could Not Endure Under William II

Believed Kaiser Lacked Brains For Task of Consolidating His Empire—Guided by Impulse

(Toronto Mail and Empire)  
However loyal a German Bismarck was he might be pardoned, if he were alive today, in deriving some satisfaction out of the ruin of the empire whose foundations he laid. He would at least be in a position to say to William Hohenzollern, "I told you so," although, as a matter of fact, it is doubtful if he did tell the emperor what he told others, namely, that the German Empire could not endure under William II. He made this remark to the Princess Radziwill, secretary to the Empress Frederick for several years. Bismarck said that he did not consider Germany prosperous at the time in which he was speaking, 1892. He did not believe that it had many years of existence before it. He knew very well that what he had done was destined to perish, not because his own work was faulty, but because of the character of the Kaiser. He said frankly that the emperor lacked the brains necessary for the task of completing the consolidation of the empire. He was guided by impulse, not by reason. Bismarck on Government.  
The sovereign, he said, was essentially an adventurous character. His mind was incapable of settling to serious business, and was guided by sudden impulses. He was, said Bismarck, intolerant. No chancellor could long remain in office who permitted himself to be guided by impulse, and not by reason. "One cannot govern a country as one commands a regiment, and militarism cannot be applied to politics without producing chaos and trouble. Stability is required to lead men by rule, and a politician first of all must look toward the future and not toward the past. It is all very well to talk about what ought to be done but in real life the

only thing that has got to be considered is what can be done. This young man who considers himself able to improve upon the work of his grandfather forgets entirely. It is all very well to ought to have a purpose, and without one I would never have lent myself to an attack either on Austria or France."

Prince Radziwill says that the question upon which Bismarck and his master parted had to do with war. He said that Bismarck was of opinion that any war was good so long as it was not a victory justified if the chancellor, as one may gather from his remarks in the preceding paragraph, insisted that war in itself was not good, and that even a victory over another powerful country might be meaningless. As regards Russia, he could not agree that Germany wanted or needed any territorial expansion at Russia's expense. In fact, he said that Germany more questions to solve, and would particularly intensify the Polish problem. His own view was that Germany should cultivate Russian friendship, and should aim at an alliance which he considered would be an insurance policy against a war with France. He believed that such a war would come some day, because he held that the annexation of Alsace and Lorraine by Germany was a blunder of the first magnitude, and destined to provoke France to a war of revenge.  
No Friends for Kaiser.  
How close Germany and Russia were to war at the time when the skipper dropped the pilot is not known, but the revelations of Dr. Dillon and others prove that William Hohenzollern eventually came to the conclusion that Germany ought to make friends with Russia, or rather that she ought to make the Russian Czar her dupe. According to the Hohenzollern, an emperor cannot have friends, "he must only apply himself to make dupes." This remark which is one disparaging observations he permitted himself concerning the Archduke Rudolph, then heir to the Austrian throne. War-mad From Youth.  
The princess adds her testimony to that of others who have said that from boyhood, almost from infancy, the Kaiser was obsessed with dreams of military conquest. This gripped his father, who was, in his opinion, not only a clever man but a good man, and also his mother, whom she considered one of the most remarkable women of her generation. He used to dream of Caesar and Napoleon, and his great ambition was to leave a mark on the pages of history that would associate his name with theirs. It was his war lust that made it impossible for Bismarck to serve him as chancellor, for Bismarck was opposed to war in general, while warmly approving any war that might make money for Germany.

The Kaiser, on the other hand, thought that all war was good so long as it was successful. On this account Bismarck predicted that the German Empire would be ruined, and after the first smart of his mortification at being dismissed was forgotten, he expressed satisfaction that he at least would not be blamed for the destruction which he foresaw awaiting an empire ruled by a madman.

### THE HOUSING PROBLEM

(Halifax Echo.)  
The housing scheme is not to end in a promised appropriation. The federal government has already appointed its committee to confer with committees to be appointed by the provinces where housing problems are preventing development in true democracy. Where there is an acute housing problem there is a preventable disease and death and the continuance of such conditions makes progress towards the true democratic goal impossible. Democracy is not a fixed political state; it is politico-economic development along lines of social justice. There is and can be no social justice where preventable disease and death are allowed to flourish. This is why the housing problem must be solved in any country or community where democracy is the ideal and the goal.

The federal committee's duties are twofold. First, it must formulate the general principles to be followed in any housing scheme; and second, it must reach an agreement with the governments of the provinces where part of the federal housing fund of \$25,000,000 is to be applied.  
Early this month an order-in-council authorized the minister of finance to advance sums of money to the provinces providing a housing scheme, upon request of the provincial government. The committee is authorized to perform all necessary contracts to give full effect to this order, and also to secure the assistance and co-operation of Thomas Adams the conservation committee town-planning expert, and of "any person or persons specifically qualified to advise or assist the committee in carrying on its work."

### LIBERALISM AND REACTIONISM

(Toronto Globe.)  
The future usefulness of the Liberal party would be gravely compromised if it surrendered to the counsels of reactionists who are trying to identify it with opposition to public ownership, so-called, and other policies which appeal to progressive Canadians.

Le Canada, the principal morning Liberal paper in Quebec, declares that public ownership is inconsistent with the traditions and principles of the party, and labels railway nationalization and social reform as incipient Bolshevism. It may be said that this merely reflects the pro-corporation sentiment of Montreal, the centre of the financial interests opposed to public ownership, but precisely similar ideas are expressed with even more vehemence by the London Advertiser, the accredited spokesman among daily papers of the Laurier Liberal group in Ontario.
