The Story of the Diamond

Chapter 2.—What It Is.

The diamond is carbon—carbon which has become crystallized through intense heat combined with great pressure.

It is chemically identical with charcoal and graphite (black lead), into which it may be converted by heat or electricity, and yet there is an extraordinary difference between them in character.

The diamond, for instance, is a poor conductor of electricity whilst graphite is a good conductor.

It can be electrified or made phosphorescent by friction, and, if left in the sunlight for a time, will give forth light to a certain extent in the dark.

Most of us find it hard enough in these days of the high cost of living to make both ends meet by working all the time. Rev. George Scott, of the Children's Aid Society, found a family yesterday in which the husband and father had got by on one week's work this winter. The record seems almost incredible, and yet it was given by the man's wife. Outside of what little a fifteen year old son was able to earn by working, the household was practically without resources except what came from the woman's relatives.

Had the man been sick or a cripple the matter would admit of at least some palliation, but the wife described her husband as a middle aged man who was not by any means sick or unable to work. The week's work which he performed was at bagging grain. When he came home at the end of the period he told his wife he was not going back because the work was too heavy.

On several occasions since he told his wife he looked for work but whether the effort was too feeble or not the fact remains he has done nothing since. Besides the boy mentioned there are four children ranging in age from twelve years to two. Perhaps it is no matter of surprise that under the circumstances the flat was bare and cheerless and the inmates far from prosperous looking.
