LOCAL NEWS

SENTENCE SUSPENDED

IN HOLIDAY GARB.

HOME AFTER SAD MISSION

Rev. B. H. Nobles returned to the city last evening from Haldimand's point where he had been called on account of the sudden death of his nephew, Robert J. Nobles, who was shot by a bullet from his own rifle on Wednesday last, not far from his home. Mr. Nobles was not able to remain in the funeral which took place this afternoon; Rev. Mr. Bares, pastor of the church, officiated. Three of the young men, who arrived from Boston yesterday to attend the funeral and will return home tomorrow.

THE MAILS.

The Board of Trade is still keeping a watchful eye on the arrangements in connection with the British mails landed at this port. A committee is endeavoring to secure accurate information regarding the time that the mails landed at both St. John and Halifax each Monday and Tuesday. This information is needed for the purpose of comparing the merits of the rival ports and the board hopes to be able to show by facts and figures the superiority of St. John as a mail port.

THREE TIMES IN MONTH.

One man arrested last night for being drunk was fined \$8 or two months in jail, but this was allowed to stand against him. Another man arrested a few days ago for being drunk had been remanded so that it might be learned where he got the liquor. Twice before within a month he had been fined \$8 for a like offense. He was again fined \$8 or two months. He was not able to pay the fine again and was sent to jail. Another man was fined \$4 or two months in jail for drunkenness.

GAVE AGE OF BOY AS 15; HE WAS THIRTEEN

Fine of \$25 in Connection With Local Factory Act Case

Mrs. Catherine Oram of 101 Simonds street appeared in the police court this morning in answer to a charge made by Factor Inspector John Kenney, Jr., for allowing her boy, thirteen years of age, to be employed in Hamm Brothers biscuit factory. It was said she had signed a certificate showing the boy to be fifteen years old.

Mrs. Oram pleaded guilty but said she had made the misrepresentation so that her boy might procure work during the holidays. Inspector Kenney said a fine should be imposed, but asked that in this instance it be allowed to stand. Magistrate Ritchie said that there was too little concern shown on the part of parents in St. John as to the welfare of their children, that they were allowed to run around the streets at night and taken away from school too early. He said that he did not, however, agree with the statement made that New Brunswick was the most illiterate province in the dominion, according to the statistics compiled from the last census, because there were so many things to be taken into consideration.

In this particular case he said a special permit should have been applied for, and would probably have been granted, but that the statement was made to deceive Hamm Brothers. A fine of \$25 was imposed.

PLAN FOR TWO NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS

One in Cliff Street; One to Replace St. Malachi's Hall

ANNOUNCED TO TRUSTEES

With Cliff Street One Completed, Boys Would Attend There Until St. Malachi's Was Replaced—Then Be School For Girls—Project Well Received

Two new buildings of modern design both capable of accommodating a large number of pupils are probably to be added soon to the school equipment of the city. They are to be built by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc and will take the place of the schools now located in St. Malachi's Hall for boys, and in the St. Vincent's Convent, for girls.

This announcement was made last evening at a meeting of a committee of the board of school trustees, by Michael Coll, one of the trustees. The plans are however not yet complete and all details not definitely decided upon. The suggestion of such valuable additions to the school plant was received favorably by the members present and it is probable that the matter will be dealt with at the next meeting of the full board.

In its present form the plan calls for the erection of a fine building on one of the church properties in Cliff street, either on the north east corner of Cliff street and Thistle court or across the street on the Connel property either of which would provide sufficient room. When this building is completed the boys now attending St. Malachi's will be transferred to it temporarily until permanent accommodation can be provided for them.

As soon as St. Malachi's is vacated the work of providing a new boys school on that site will be undertaken. Either the present St. Malachi's building may be remodelled, and a new addition erected on the vacant lot adjoining or present building will be torn down and an entire new structure built. When this second school is completed it will be occupied by the boys who formerly attended the old St. Malachi's and the new building in Cliff street will be given over for use as a girls' school. To the Cliff street school will be transferred the girls now occupying quarters in St. Vincent's Convent building. While this building has given good service it is not perfectly adapted for school purposes and the new building will be a great improvement. The present school rooms there will then revert to the use of the Sisters of Charity who are the owners.

The new buildings will not only provide more attractive and more comfortable place for the pupils but will also provide additional accommodation for the steadily increasing number of pupils in the educational facilities of the city.
