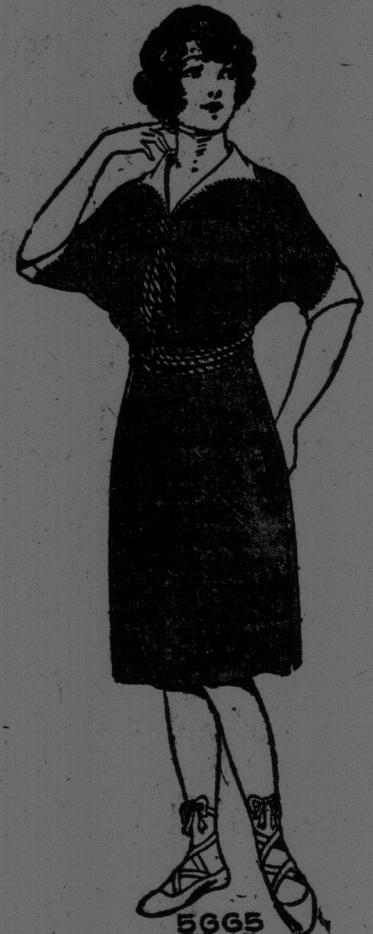

Disestablishment of the Church in Wales

FIFTY YEARS OF EFFORT

likely to receive much consideration from the Welsh members of the House of Commons, their Liberal supporters, both non-conformist and churchmen, and above all the Irish Nationalists, who voted regularly for the bill, perhaps not much because they liked its principles as because of a desire to get it out of the way to give a clear road for the new rule bill.

While home rule has attracted more attention, on account of the opposition of a portion of Ulster, the Welsh church bill has created almost as much feeling between the two political parties, and between the Church of England and the Liberals.

The Welsh Liberals—and with one or two exceptions all members of the House of Commons from the principality are Liberals—were busy early in the year urging the passage of the bill, and supporting candidates in constituencies throughout the kingdom pledged to vote for it. The bishops and their supporters were just as busy. In every by-election, organizations opposed to disestablishment entered the constituency to fight candidates who favored the bill, and Liberal churchmen were particularly urged to go against their party on this measure. All this has counted heavily against the government and several by-elections have been influenced by it.

Mr. Asquith has, however, gone steadily forward, endeavoring to carry out the pledges he gave the Welshmen twenty years ago to disestablish the church when it was in his power to do so.

Now that the disestablishment bill has been passed it is believed that all the old animosities aroused by it will be forgotten. The government of any rate has taken the first step toward that happy conclusion by appointing a non-partisan commission to carry out the provisions of the bill. This commission is composed of Sir Henry Primrose, a civil servant of long and distinguished service, who is a member of the Episcopal Church of Scotland; Sir William Pender, a clerical accountant, member of the Church of England, and Sir Herbert Roberts, a Welsh non-conformist member of the House of Commons.

The functions of the commission will be to judge of administrative and actual financial loss. The bishops and clergy will continue to receive their present incomes so long as they hold their offices, and they will also be left in the enjoyment of their palaces and parsonages. The present incumbent will moreover retain possession of the glebes and curates at any time within five years exchange their existing interests in the emoluments of office for an annuity, and thereupon retire. Churches and church buildings, including residences of the clergy, plate and furniture, all funds and endowments specially allocated to the repair, restoration, or improvement of churches or ecclesiastical residences, all closed burial grounds and private benefactions made since 1802 remain vested in the church.

What the church loses are the burial grounds and glebes and curates' charges, which go to the county and borough councils, and which produce the greater part of the amount mentioned in the bill. The money will be devoted to health and educational purposes.

While strongly opposed to disestablishment, the Church party attack more subtly the disestablishment proposals, which they say will cripple the Church in Wales. In Cardiff, for example, it is estimated that the present income of 514,000, one subscription, only \$3,000 will be left.

Lord Mersey left London on Saturday for Canada to take his place on the board to inquire into the Empress of Ireland disaster.

The schooner Kolan foundered on Friday during a heavy gale off Sambro Ledges, N. S., and the captain and crew were brought to Halifax yesterday on the schooner Romance. The Kolan was from the Magdalenes, with fish for Machias, Me.

The handsome home of Alexander Gibson at Marysville, N. B., was destroyed by fire on Saturday at a loss of about \$5,000.

Fully ten thousand people attended the funeral service held in Toronto yesterday for the seventeen Salvation Army victims of the Empress disaster, conducted by Commissioner Thos. McKie, of London, England. More than 150,000 persons lined the route of the funeral procession.

Suffragettes yesterday invaded the Catholic churches in London. In Westminster Cathedral a woman interrupted Father Bernard Vaughan in his sermon by shouting an appeal against forcible feeding. She was removed by the authorities. In the Church of the Oratory several women were removed after interrupting the mass by singing "God Save Emmeline Pankhurst."

A big banking house suspended business on Saturday, Chaplin, Milne, Grenfell & Co., going to the wall with liabilities of \$25,000,000. The head of the defunct institution was a son-in-law of Harry Grey. Speculation by one of the partners is given as the cause of the failure.

The Allan Line Corinthian, from Montreal for London, collided with the little steamer Oriole, on the Thames, England, on Saturday, and sank her.

Henry J. Matthews, of New York, was arrested in Toronto on Saturday after having tendered the clerk of a hotel a five dollar bill which was found to be one of \$278,000 stolen in 1911 from the Bank of Montreal at New Westminster, B. C. Notes of the Montreal bank amounting to \$8,000 were found in his possession.

CAROLINE COE'S TESTED RECIPES

Pickled Beets. Slice one quart of cold boiled beets, pack in jar. Mix one teaspoon of salt one of brown sugar, one-eighth teaspoon of pepper or two red pepper corns one teaspoon of celery seed. Turg into one pint of warm vinegar. Turn over.

Whole Wheat Griddle Cakes. Sift one quart of whole wheat flour with one teaspoon of baking powder and one teaspoon of salt into bowl. Add

one tablespoon of melted butter, one tablespoon of sugar, two eggs, well beaten, and two cups of milk.

Best in even round cakes on griddle. Serve with quince honey.

French Beets. Wash beet tops and cook in slightly salted water. Cook bottoms in separate pan. When done, put into cold water and beets not too fine. Chop one teaspoon of onion for each pint of beets, put two tablespoons of butter into pan. Add onion and cook five minutes but do not brown. Add beets, heat hot and serve.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS. A good remedy for a cough is to put a lemon into boiling water. Boil it for a quarter of an hour. Then press out the pulp into a jar, removing the seeds, and mix it very thoroughly with a quarter of a pound of honey. Take a teaspoon when required.

A good way to use up coal dust is to save all paper bags, fill them with the dust, and when the fire requires mending place a bag of coal on top. This plan is much cleaner than putting on the dust in shovelfuls, as it cakes, and so does not tumble through the bars of the grate on to the hearth.

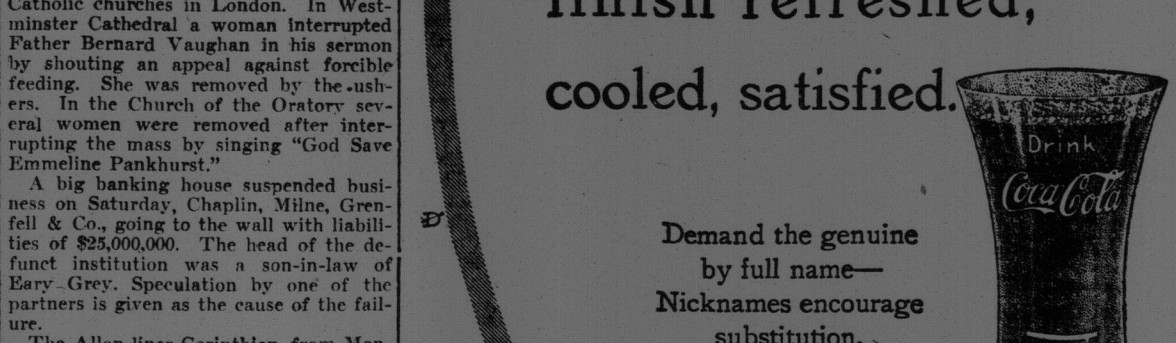
