

VAST ESTATES FOR GOOD WORK

Odesa, Dec. 20—From Yavva it is announced that the heiresses of the late Field-Marshal Count Milutin, the Princess Dolgorukova and the Countess Milutina have conveyed to the Russian Red Cross their father's mansion and estate at Simsa, in the Southern Crimea, the value of which is assessed at 1,500,000 roubles. In accordance with the testator's wish Simsa is to become a sanatorium for tuberculosis patients.

In addition to this bequest another estate of the late field-marshal, also valued at 1,200,000 roubles, is presented to the Red Cross Society, with the right of selling or otherwise disposing of it.

Field-Marshal Count Milutin died five months ago at Simsa in his ninety-sixth year. He was a former minister for war, a man of advanced liberal ideas, a military reformer, and a distinguished coadjutor of Alexander II. in formulating the act of self-sacrificing in 1881.
