Queen Wilhelmina Is Sad Lack of Beauty In The Royal Child of Holland

The Hague, Oct. 7.—Good Queen Wilhelmina is disconcerted because the world is ugly and she asks imperatively what people meant by making an ugly world. The troubles are her palace and her daughter, also her husband who lately had to spend months alone and then with his wife and queen, at Tannus in Germany, to cure himself of ills the nature of which most know, not even the doctors. Henry of Mecklenburg was never a beauty. Nobody expects it in a man, but Good Queen Wilhelmina wants to know why her palace, which she dearly loves, and her child, which she loves still more, are not beautiful—why they are not as beautiful, say, as the Palace of Dioxletan at Spalato, and the three daughters of Eurynome?
All last winter good Queen Wilhelmina worried about her palace. The fact is she was badly lodged. Dutchmen are thrifty, builders are lazy, bricks are damp. There was only one palace—that at odorous Amsterdam where a foreign sovereign could be housed; and the favorite country chateau of Het Loo was too small and too troublesome. At first that did not matter. Good Queen Wilhelmina was young, and (on post-cards) beautiful; she sought no pomp or festival and she lived as quietly as did her ancient papa when he married Emma of Waldeck.
And now good Queen Wilhelmina has grown exceedingly stout (even, not even cards); and she wants more room, and wants to live like a queen. She loves her Het Loo, which is near Apeldoorn, right in Holland's centre, but Het Loo grew impossible. Like everything near the somnolent Zuider Zee it was neglected. The good queen and ugly Henry lived in a few rooms the shutters were always closed, and dust heaped in hills. The palace grew ugly, and the good queen can stand nothing ugly—except Princess Juliana.
Therefore last winter much money was spent in putting Het Loo in order. Much of it was rebuilt, and many rooms were added. The work was mostly done when the good queen was in the Tannus, looking after ugly Henry, and it was to be ready for her copper wedding. A copper wedding, unlike a leather wedding, is not a joke. All Dutchmen and Dutchwomen celebrate as their copper wedding the completion of twelve and a half years of conjugal joy. Cynics say because after twelve and a half comes thirteen and thirteen is the end of luck in horse-racing, marriage, poker and other sports.
When good Queen Wilhelmina came back from the Tannus the scaffolds poles were all down, and Het Loo showed its new face. The good queen was enraged.

Good Queen Wilhelmina spent \$500,000 on Het Loo—a big sum for a poorish queen to spend mainly trying to make things beautiful. To make Juliana beautiful nothing is spent but infinite, never-ceasing care. The good queen is Juliana's own maid, Juliana has other maids—a German and an English one—but Queen Wilhelmina tubs and dresses her own daughter. She thinks that will be her own beautiful. The queen's deep grief at Juliana's lack of beauty is concealed from none, because the queen is a woman and cannot conceal anything except things everyone knows; and she shows her sorrow and humiliation by disliking other people's pretty children, and by loving their ugly children.
There are myriads of pretty—and myriads of ugly—children in Holland; and Meppel, which lies an hour away near the somnolent Zuider Zee, is known for its pretty children. When good Queen Wilhelmina motored there in June, she went to the village school and favored the ugly girls. She gave sweets to the pretty girls, but she talked only to the ugly ones. "Even the newspapers wrote about it," said the Dutch, "so it must be true." "May we enquire, Your Majesty?" asked the schoolma'am, "with the grilles?" "You may," said good Queen Wilhelmina, getting among the children. And she beckoned the only two ugly children in Meppel, and was photographed holding their hands, and she gave them an extra large portion of sweets.
Thus does good Queen Wilhelmina soothe her mother's heart for dear little Juliana, for dear little Juliana's broadish nose, dullish eyes, drooping mouth, and lank, dank hair.

THE BALKAN ATROCITIES
Evidence gathered by the International Carnegie Commission in its searching inquiry into the atrocities committed by the different belligerents during the Balkan wars reveals incidents of horrible savagery, not only on the part of the Bulgarians, whose cruelty had been fully brought to light in the press, but also similar facts relative to the Greek methods of "vengeance."
The commission believes it has established the authenticity of letters which testify that the Greek soldiers made use of the forbidden dum-dum bullets, while many other atrocities are also disclosed. Every facility for investigation was given the members of the commission by the governments of Greece, Turkey, and Bulgaria, but the inquiries did not extend to the Roumanians. Some opposition was met among the people of Greece at the Serbian attitude towards the inquiry was hostile. The Bulgarians were guilty of the worst cruelty, but they seem to have committed few horrors during their war with the Turks. The enquiries of the commission have been completed, and its conclusion will be published in book form.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Exeter Cake
One egg, one cup sugar, half cup butter, half cup molasses, one cup sour milk, two and a half cups flour, one cup raisins, two-thirds teaspoon soda, cassia, cloves, nutmeg, and little mace. Two small loaves or one large one.

Peach Custard
One pint of milk, one egg, two-thirds cup sugar, three level teaspoons cornstarch, one teaspoonful of butter. Put milk on to boil, beat egg very light, add sugar and beat till creamy, then add the cornstarch dissolved in a little cold water when the milk comes to a boil and cook five minutes, then put in the butter. Peaches, peeled, stoned and cut up fine, dates stoned and chopped and floured. Pile into a glass dish.
