Baseball Baker's Post Duplicated. Frank Baker is not the only player who has made two home runs in a single game. His pair, coming under dramatic circumstances, created more furor than any previous home run making in the world's championship series, but the feat has been performed twice before.

Two-base hitting has flourished extensively in the world's series, but there has been a noticeable shortage of three-baggers. No doubt ground rules limiting long hits into outfield crowds to two-baggers have been strictly responsible.

Except in that year triples have been frequent. There was not one in 1895 between the Giants and Athletics, two in 1900 between the Sox and Cubs, three in 1907 between the Cubs and Detroit, two in 1908 between the Cubs and Tigers, one in 1909 between the Tigers and Pirates, and two in 1910 between the Athletics and Cubs.

The two-bagger record prior to this year is: 1895—Boston, four; Pirates 7; 1896—Giants seven, Athletics five; 1906—Sox one, Cubs nine; 1907—Cubs six, Tigers one; 1908—Cubs four, Tigers five; 1909—Pirates thirteen, Tigers sixteen; 1910—Athletics nineteen, Cubs eleven. So it will be seen that previous series have furnished much longer hitting than this year's contests.

Home runs prior to this year were made as follows: 1895—Dougherty, two; Sebring, 1905—None; 1906—None; 1907—None; 1908—Tinker, one; 1909—Clarke, two; D. Jones, Crawford, 1910—None.

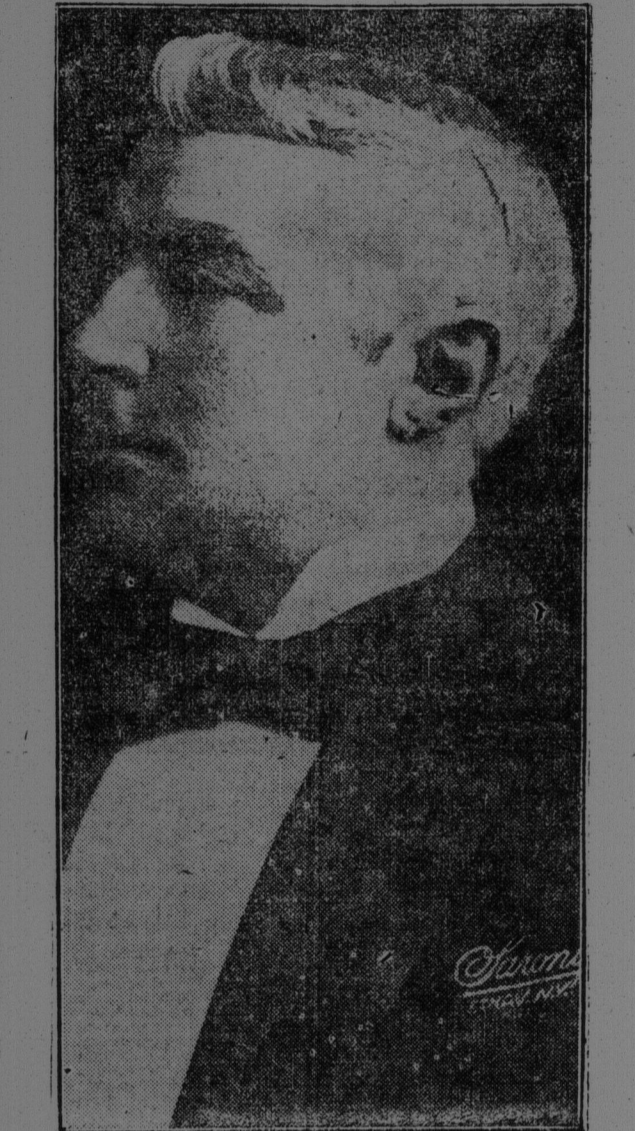

Washington, Nov. 6.—Leaders of national politics are looking ahead with acute interest to the state elections tomorrow because of their possible bearing on the presidential campaign of next year.
