LA MARQUISE DE FONTENAY

The Marriage of a Prince—The Corps d'Elite of Austria—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach Again to Front

Prince Charles de Beauveau-Craon, whose marriage to the daughter of the Count and Countess de St. Audegonde has just taken place in Paris, is one of the few great French nobles who, in addition to their other honors, are Grandees of Spain, and Princes of the Holy Roman Empire, and therefore entitled by the latter high distinction to be addressed as Serene Highness. He is the sixth prince of his line, is about thirty-four years old and, like the fairytale hero of our childhood, the famous Marquis de Carabas, owns a great number of chateaux, including the ancient castle of Craon in the department of Meurthe-et-Moselle, which has been the home of his family ever since 1870, when Pierre Beauveau married Jeanne, last of the then already ancient house of Craon.

The present prince is also Marquis de Beauveau and Marquis de Craon. His title of Prince of the Holy Roman Empire was registered by Louis XV, who added thereto that of a French prince. The family of Beauveau who came originally from Angoumois has furnished to France field marshals, ministers of state, ambassadors, prelates, and men of letters. Prince Marc de Beauveau-Craon was made the mentor of Duke Francis of Lorraine, and when the latter became German Emperor, as husband of Maria Theresa, he was appointed viceroy of the Grand-Duchy of Tuscany, which Francis had exchanged for his Duchy of Lorraine.

Prince Charles, another of the family, won fame as a soldier in the latter part of the eighteenth century, and eventually became one of the last ministers of state to Louis XVI, meeting his death in his seventy-fourth year on the scaffold at the Place de la Concorde, with the perfect calm that had always been one of his distinguishing traits.

The present prince is the only male survivor of his line and, unless his bride presents to him a son in due course, another great historic French house will come extinct, since none of his German or French honors can in this case pass on to female heirs.

The one blot on the escutcheon of Craon is the fact that his paternal great-grandmother was the famous Madame de Cayla, the favorite of Louis XVIII. One of her daughters married the third Prince de Beauveau-Craon and brought to him the immense wealth given to her mother by the king.

Mme. de Cayla was the daughter of Advocate-General Omer Talon, and was educated at the famous school of Madame Campan, where she had as companions, Hortense de Beauharnais, mother of Napoleon III, Caroline Bonaparte, consort of King Murat of Naples, Mile. Leclaire, who became the wife of Marshal Davoust, and Madame de Remusat, author of the most widely read memoirs of the First Empire.

The king's favorite died in 1802, bequeathing as I have said already, everything to her daughter, Princess Isabeau de Beauveau-Craon, except the chateau and park of St. Quen, (another gift of the king) which she left to the Comte de Chambord, (Henri V.) He refused to accept it and the city of Paris put in a claim for the ownership which was promptly contested by Princess Isabeau. She finally won the suit, and subsequently sold the property.

Those who have visited Vienna, and especially those who have had the honor of presentation at the Austrian Court, will recall the superb appearance of the emperor's corps of mounted guards, or to give them their proper title—the "Leibgarde Reiter Escadron." The officers of this Corps d'Elite, who are recruited from the greatest houses in the land, are always on duty at the Hofburg, and on state occasions show their thoroughbred horses and their fine uniforms, when they accompany the emperor's carriage. It is often from among them that the young archduchesses seek their partners at the court balls, for, as a rule, they are the best dancers in Austria.

The emperor has just appointed to the command of this corps, his aide-de-camp, Prince von Welfersheim, in succession to Count Felix von Thun-Hohenstein, who retired on account of ill-health. The prince is the morgagnic son of the late Prince Charles Hohenlohe and of the latter's wife, a woman of humble birth, known as Marie Gratzl, a native of the little town of Welfersheim, which is comprised in the vast domain of the princely house of Hohenlohe. She was created, on the occasion of her marriage, Baroness von Bronn, by the late King of Wurtemberg, and it is under the name of Prince

MARINE NEWS. Cape Town, June 11—The British steamer Canada Caps, from St. John, before reported having been beached on fire (fire afterward extinguished), has been refloated and docked.

Viscount St. Aldwyn, who put on overall last week, and lamp in hand, descended into the depths of a coal mine in order to obtain information at first hand regarding the conditions under which the miners have to work, and to see a great deal of credit for his activity and his thoroughness. He is far from being a young man, having reached his seventy-fifth year.

Before being raised to the peerage in 1906, he was known as Sir Michael Hicks Beach, and filled the offices of secretary for Ireland, secretary of state for the colonies, and chancellor of the exchequer. He entered parliament in 1884 at a time when Herbert Asquith was a small boy at school, and Lloyd-George was an infant in arms.

He is generally understood to have been indebted for his early appointments to office, to the fact that his marvelous reticence, and cold, reserved and aloof manner attracted the attention of Lord Beaconsfield at a dinner, and deeply impressed the famous Tory leader.

Lord St. Aldwyn is a typical Tory of the old school, and an ultra-conservative in all his notions. In his earlier days, before he was known as Viscount Aldwyn, he was called by his fellow members in parliament by the nickname of "Black Michael." He takes his title of Viscount Aldwyn from his estate in Gloucestershire, known as Coln St. Aldwyn, near Fairford.

Daily Hints For the Cook

PUDDING HARD SAUCE. Cream together two tablespoonsful of butter and a cupful of powdered sugar until smooth and soft. Then add a few drops of lemon juice or other preferred flavoring.

LEMON PUDDING. To one pint of milk add one cup of white bread crumbs, quarter cup sugar, one teaspoon of butter, grated rind of one lemon, yolk of two eggs, mix all well together, and bake slowly for half an hour.

PICNIC EGGS. Boil the eggs 15 minutes, cut open lengthwise, take out the yolks and mash them with a silver fork; all as much ground meat as you have yolks; use salad dressing to moisten; fill the whites with the mixture and fasten together with toothpicks. Potted ham or tongue could be used.
