### SAYS HE SAW BEATTIE KILL WIFE

Alleged Eye Witness to Tragedy, However, Will Not Be Called to Stand

Chesterfield Court House, Va., Sept. 7.—Prosecutor Wendenburg declared today that he had decided not to request the reopening of the Beattie case on account of the discovery of an alleged eye witness. The state considers that it already has a sufficiently strong case.  
The new witness, who until a few days ago was believed to be Mrs. Beattie, was a farmhand employed on a place near the scene of the crime, said he actually saw Beattie kill his wife, saw him knock her from the automobile with the butt of a shot gun, and then shoot her as she lay motionless on the ground. He wrote that Beattie treated him when he found that he had witnessed the deed, and then gave him a suit of clothes and money with which to go away.

### FRANCE AND GERMANY; THE SETTLEMENT

Berlin, Sept. 7.—The meeting between the German foreign minister and the French ambassador, when it is expected that Germany's reply to France's proposals regarding Morocco, will be handed to the ambassador, will take place this afternoon. Herr Von Kiderlin Waechter, the foreign secretary declares that danger of war between Germany and France over Morocco has passed.  
Germany, according to him, never had the slightest intention of going to war, about what he called a "parcel of African sandhills". It is further understood that the future political status of France in Morocco has been settled.  
It is clear that Germany will consent to a French protectorate over Morocco in return for a treaty which will strictly define her economic rights in that country, and in addition to this a slice of the Congo. It is understood that Germany is asking 600,000 square miles in the Congo. France is reluctant to cede more than 150,000 square miles.

### BURGESS WAS VERY NEAR TO GIVING IT UP

Swim Across English Channel a Trying Experience—How it Was Accomplished

Dual, England, Sept. 7.—Burgess' swim across the channel yesterday was accomplished in the face of tremendous odds. Taken sick in the earlier portions of his journey, his eyes inflamed so that he could scarcely see and affected many times by cramps of the heart and stomach, he was at several points on the verge of giving up.  
He had been well greeted for the trip and were a pair of goggles and rubber bathing cap. A party of eleven accompanied him in a motor boat.  
Soon after the start, the wind freshened and for a time the swimmer had a bad experience in a heavy sea. The water penetrated his goggles and inflamed his eyes. During the last few hours, the chance of a successful swim, seemed remote.  
After four hours the wind began to drop and the sea became smooth again. The swimmer was then able to see and to eat. He decided to go on, although feeling in bad condition.  
The end of the flood tide, on which he started, found the swimmer three miles north of the South Sands Head lightship. The tide was tremendously strong, but the weather rapidly improved. Burgess' spirits revived and after seven hours, he was three miles south of Yarmouth, roughly speaking half way across.  
By midnight the wind had subsided altogether, there was an only calm on the water and Burgess had completely recovered, and was swimming powerfully. He was repeatedly stung by jelly fish but made little of this trouble.  
The swimmer Wedman dived in and accompanied Burgess from 9 o'clock until after midnight. The night was ideal with a bright moon, but there was haze on the water. Burgess took hot milk, cream and chocolate at half hour intervals.

### GIRL TARRED AND FEATHERED BY CROWD

Sensational Time Follows Action—Escort Said to Have Been in Plot and Enticed Her to the Place

New York, Sept. 7.—A despatch to the World from Lincoln, Kansas, says: "Sensational testimony is expected at the trial of a number of young men who live in the vicinity of Shady Bend, on the charge of having tarred and feathered Miss Mary Chamberlain, of Berkeley, a pretty 18 year old girl. The country is all worked up over the affair and there has been talk of lynching."  
The attack on the girl occurred a few nights ago, when she went out for a drive accompanied by Burgess. As they were driving along a country road they were stopped by boys and men who took the girl out of the buggy and stripped her of her clothing. The men then stood around talking turns in applying the tar and throwing feathers over her.  
After jerking the girl and driving her into hysteria, they replaced her in the buggy, and on the way to the hotel, while the men were tarring the girl returned to the buggy and drove her home.  
The parade and feathered Miss Mary Chamberlain was arrested and has been sentenced to a year in jail. It was charged that he entered into conspiracy to entice the girl to the spot, where the gang was waiting to attack her. He pleaded guilty and promises the overman sentence gave the names of all the others concerned. It was said that the reason for the attack was revenge. Miss Chamberlain was alleged to have made about some other girls.

### MISSIONARIES FROM HERE MAY BE IN DANGER OF LIVES

Boston, Sept. 7.—The lives of many missionaries, several of whom come from the maritime provinces, and are sent out by the Baptist mission board in Toronto, are believed to be endangered by the riots in China. Chinese officers of the American Baptist foreign missionary society today received a cablegram from the missionaries at Chengchi, which said: "American consular advisers as to leave." Today's message has convinced the societies officers here that the situation has reached an acute stage and that the lives of the missionaries and the mission property are in danger.  
Peking—Missionaries in the outlying districts of Sze-Chuen province have been ordered by the victory to concentrate in the larger towns.  
All foreigners in Chengchi, the capital of Sze-Chuen province, are taking refuge in the compound of the missionary society of the Methodist church of Canada. Sze-Chuen is a western province of China, bordering on Tibet.
