THE DOCK SCHEME.

PROVINCIAL SECRETARY MCGILL
LAYS HIS LETTER.

He writes to Mayor Lockhart that the
Government is prepared to grant a
subsidy to Mr. Leary for the
dock on the same terms as the
city Council.
This morning Mayor Lockhart waited
on Provincial Secretary McGill to
ascertain the exact position of the
Government towards the scheme of
harbour improvement proposed by James
D. Leary and endorsed by the
Common Council. The Provincial Secretary
received His Worship in a most cordial
manner and after a short interview in
which he gave his promise of support to
the scheme of harbor improvement, sent
for Solicitor General Pughly who had
also received the mayor's most cordial
and stated that he was entirely in
sympathy with the action of the
Common Council and heartily supported
Mr. Leary's scheme for harbor improvements.
Telephone communication was had with
the Attorney General Frederick who
also expressed his entire sympathy with
the scheme and gave his complete
endorsement to the following letter which
is also endorsed by Mr. Pughly.

W. A. Lockhart, Esq., Mayor of St. John,
N. B.—In answer to your enquiry
regarding the Provincial subsidy for
wharf and harbor improvements, I beg
to inform you that by the Order in
Council recently passed by the Government,
I am authorized and prepared to
grant to you in full the sum of \$100,000
in aid of the scheme of harbor
improvements, in the name and on behalf
of the Province, provided that you
secure the subsidy to Mr. Leary on the
same terms and conditions as agreed to
by the City Council in making their grant.
