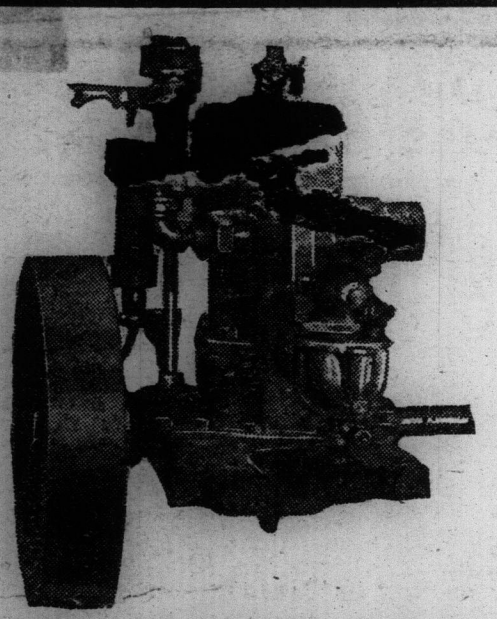

About Fish

We learn from the Trade Review that the only sales of fish last week were those made from merchant to merchant, to complete cargoes for export, and that the last lots were sold at \$6.70 per qt. for the quality known as "good Brazil." This, in our opinion, tends to prove that the price will remain firm.

Only very small quantities of new fish have as yet come in. This is probably owing to the prevalence of bad weather for curing the product. It was of a very small size, not much better than tomatoes, but it realized \$6.50 per quintal.

Judging from the foregoing, the price is likely to go up when the first-grade fish begins to come in, and we would impress upon our fishermen the necessity of giving the strictest care and attention to the curing of their fish, and also point out to them the great advantage to be gained by putting the best article possible in the market.

The demand appears to be good. With American and French buyers anxious to secure all the fish they can get, and a short Norwegian catch as well, there seems to be no perceptible reason why our fishermen should not reap a rich harvest from the sea this season.

A good article is never dear. Let one and all, therefore, unite in a determination to excel in producing the best result possible for their labors, and make the article demand the price.

About Codoil

The codoil market seems to be in a very weak and fluctuating condition, and dealers appear to be undecided as to how things are likely to shape themselves.

Common oil, which a few weeks ago sold for \$150 per ton, is now quoted at \$142.50 for last year's product, while refined oil has dropped to \$1.75 and \$1.50 per gallon.

Refiners who have forwarded small lots to the St. John's market have, with the exception of those who had contracted for the high prices offered some time ago, found that they could not get more than \$1.75 per gallon for their goods.

Dealers, however, anticipate that the price will improve within a short time, but they do not feel disposed to take chances, and are consequently sitting tight.

We learn that a large percentage of the new oil coming in is of an inferior quality. This is regrettable, as, with codoil, like every other product, it is the quality of the article that counts.

Of course a large number of our people have gone into the oil refining business this year, and while some of them may lack experience, we think that by the exercise of due carefulness and judgement in their refineries they can succeed in turning out a product fully up to the standard.

Over production, or the production of an inferior article tends to depress the market and lower the price. The man who wants to build up a business and make that business pay will take as his motto—Quality not Quantity.

Graham Crosbie Dies of Wounds

"Regret to inform you that Record Office Nfld. Regiment, London, to-day reports that the Tenth General Hospital, Rouen, reports that your son, No. 1449 Private George G. Crosbie, died of wounds out of hospital July 4. J. R. BENNETT, Col. Secy."

The above is a copy of the message received by Mrs. Walter Crosbie on Monday last, informing her of the death of her son, Graham.

Private George Graham Crosbie was the eldest son of Walter and Minnie Crosbie, of Bay Roberts West. He was but 17 years of age when he enlisted, and barely 18 at the time of his death. He was a member of the C. L. B. of this town, and was popular and well-liked.

Leaving St. John's with F. Co. 1st Nfld. Regt., in June, 1915, he was, on arrival in France, transferred to D Company, attached to the 29th Division.

No particulars regarding his death have as yet been received, but it is presumed he must have been in the thick of the fight during the great forward movement on July 1st, when our regiment suffered such heavy casualties.

His parents will have, we feel confident, the deepest sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement, and the Guardian joins with them.

Give Us More News

Much dissatisfaction is expressed at the manner in which war news is being given out in Bay Roberts. At the present critical time, when the eyes of the entire community are fixed on the movements of our regiment at the front, and relatives and friends of the absent ones are anxiously awaiting news, it seems to us that the least we should expect from the Government is a morning and evening message each day.

We learn that some of the neighboring towns are thus favored, in some instances even receiving messages on Sunday, and it would be a matter of much gratification to our citizens if the same privileges were extended to them.

We, therefore, take this opportunity to call the attention of the Postal Telegraph authorities to the matter, and trust that it will not be overlooked.

More Cots Needed

The Newfoundland centre of the St. John's Ambulance Association is making a very special appeal for funds for the maintenance of hospital cots in France and England.

The appeal comes to Newfoundlanders very strongly now because of the casualties which have recently taken place in connection with our Regiment.

There is a Newfoundland ward of 30 cots in the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital at Etaples, France.

Two of the cots there are named Bay Roberts and Azariah Dawe respectively. These cots were given and are being supported by Mr. Azariah Dawe, of this town.

An impression is abroad that no more are wanted, but such is not the case. Many more are needed. The Royal Stores employees have guaranteed the upkeep of five cots a week during the duration of the war. Each cot costs \$5 per week. The money necessary for the upkeep of those need not be paid right down.

There are many wounded members belonging to our Regiment. Fresh beds are greatly needed owing to severe fighting. Who will help? The Guardian will be pleased to receive donations.

College Extension Lectures

PRELIMINARY NOTICE

Courses of lectures covering the requirements of the Licentiate in Arts of the Council of Higher Education and of the second, or Sophomore year, in certain Canadian Universities, will be organized for the next Academic year, beginning October 1st, 1916, and ending April 30th, 1917. The following, and possibly other subjects will be included:—English, Mathematics, Latin, French, Physics, Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

Candidates passing successfully through such of those courses of lectures as are required for the Second Year in Arts in the Universities, will be admitted as Third Year students in the Universities, provided they are otherwise qualified. Each of the lecture courses will be open to qualified students whether they have graduation in view or not.
