MONCTON, May 15.—James Hamill was arrested at Point du Chene yesterday, on the charge of murdering his brother, Owen Hamill, whose dead body was found in an old I. C. R. box car, used as a coal car, at the station at that place, on Sunday evening, the 28th of November last. The body will be exhumed and a post mortem examination held. The facts in connection with Hamill's death were rather suspicious. He suffered from locomoto ataxia, and does not appear to have been much of a favorite with other members of the family. In fact, his brother at the inquest swore that they were not on speaking terms and that they quarreled and sometimes came to blows. The facts as brought out at the inquest, which many thought did not proceed far enough, are that Hamill left his home at the Point on Sunday morning, November 28th, to go to the wharf to fish, as was his usual custom. He did not return, but memers of the family do not appear to have made any enquiry about him. It was after dark in the evening when one of the railway hands, who had gone to the coal house for coal, found the body. James Hamill swore that he had not seen his brother at all en Sunday, though he heard him get up and supposed he went out. James Hamill further swore that he had been at the I. C. R. round house all day with some companions drinking from a bottle, and that being pretty full he had gone to bed early and was in bed when he heard the news of the finding of the body of his brother.
