Subscriptions will be made on the basis of population. New South Wales contributing \$4,000,000 and Victoria \$3,000,000.

Wall Street Reports.

NEW YORK, March 30.—The specu-
lative advance came to pause in the
stock market today and there was a
general disposition to take a survey
of the position and seek light on the
sources and motives of the sudden ac-
tivity which sprang up on Saturday
and continued yesterday. The incli-
nation to take profits on the consider-
able rise thus suddenly achieved lay
at the bottom of the check and the
manner in which this opinion was con-
ducted was accepted as proof of the
capable and skilful leadership into
which the speculation has fallen. The
profit-taking sales were not pushed
at the expense of prices, but were con-
stantly renewed when prices showed
any advance and the market any
strength sufficient to absorb the sell-
ing. When the realizing had begun
to affect prices and cause a dropping
tendency, some influential stock was
picked out for a demonstration after
strength with a view to the senti-
mental effect on the tone of the market.

Extracts from "The St. John City
Assessment Law of 1889."
"Sec. 112. The Assessors shall as-
certain, as nearly as possible, the
particulars of the Real Estate, the
Personal Estate, and the Income of
any person who has not brought in a
statement in accordance with this law,
and as required by this law, and
shall make an estimate thereof, at
the true value and amount, to the
best of their information and belief;
and such estimate shall be conclusive
upon all persons who have not filed
their statements in due time, unless
they can show a reasonable excuse
for the omission.
"Sec. 123. No person shall have
an abatement unless he has filed with
the Assessors the statement, under
oath, within the time hereinbefore
required; nor shall the Common
Council in any such case, sustain an
appeal from the judgment of the
Assessors, unless they shall be satis-
fied that there was good cause why the
statement was not filed in due time
as herein provided.
