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DIVORCE OF CHURCH AND STATE URGED

Complete Separation of Temporal and Spiritual Authority—Journalistic Peace Movement.

Berlin, July 19.—The separation of church and state is becoming a live question in Germany. For several years the supporters of this idea have been growing numerous among the intelligent classes of the people. University professors are coming forward in increasing numbers in favor of it, and it is receiving more and more attention among the political parties. The Social Democratic party has made it one of the planks in its platform for many years. The Radicals demanded the separation about 60 years ago, after the stirring events of 1848, and it is assumed that they will again support it if the question should come up for a vote in the Prussian legislature. Even the Conservative party, which contains most of the orthodox Protestants of the country, is evidently viewing the idea of a separation with growing sympathy. The Kreuz-Zeitung, the organ of that party, has just printed a leading editorial on the matter, in which it says: "In the Conservative party there is a rapidly growing disposition to prevent the further secularization and externalization of the church by separating it from the state." The growing estrangement of the German people from all churches is another argument advanced. It is said that not more than one person in 100 in Berlin attends church. Several recent heresy trials in the Prussian Evangelical Church have also given a strong impetus to the sentiment for a separation. It is the opinion of the National-Zeitung, a leading National Liberal organ, that there is already a clear majority in the country favoring the separation of church and state.

The journalistic attempt to bring about a peaceful settlement of the differences between Germany and England by means of an exchange of views between prominent representatives of both nations, carried out by the publishers of the well known German monthly "North and South," seems merely to have intensified the controversy. The views of Balfour, Lord Haldane, Sir Thomas Barclay and a long list of other prominent English politicians and publicists are answered by twenty-three leading Germans, representing parliamentary, military, banking, industrial, agrarian and journalistic circles in the July number just published. The list of contributors to the German symposium includes Prince Liechowsky of the House of Lords, Arthur von Geyr, August Taysen, one of the greatest German industrial leaders, Count von Helldorf, former Minister of the Interior, Prince von Schoenbach-Carath, Ernst Barmann, Count von Schwerin-Loewitz and other prominent members of the Reichstag, Vice Admirals Calster and von Ahlefeld, Professor Schlemmer, a newspaper writer popularly supposed to have been the editor of the Berlin Tageblatt and probably the most influential journalist in Germany.

Balfour's arraignment of Germans for following a "policy incompatible with the rights of other nations," and Sir Thomas Barclay's criticism of the German settlement of the Franco-Prussian War have naturally failed to please, and there is in return a quite general criticism of English policy as desiring to hamper Germany at all costs. One and all, the German writers defend the existence of a strong German fleet as a vital issue for Germany, being needed to protect its constantly growing foreign commerce and insure the import of the food supply as necessary for Germany as for England. It is pointed out that even in the best years Germany raises only enough food to feed her population six days of the week and cites English statistics to show that while England has to import food for 30,000,000 of its population Germany must do the same with but 21,000,000 to 22,000,000 of hers.

While potash mines are free from the terrible explosion which made coal mining dangerous to life and property, a disaster at the Jesenitz mine in Silesia shows that potash mining is an extremely risky business for the capitalist. This mine, on which about \$4,000,000 had been spent for development, has been totally wrecked by an inflow of water, an underground connection having been established with other potash mines distant. While a party of mining officials were at the bottom of the shaft, over half a mile below the surface, repairing the hoisting apparatus, a mighty rush of water was heard in the distant tunnels. The men were hurried to the surface, and found that the level of the lake fell more than a foot, showing that over 400,000 gallons of water had gone into the mine from the lake alone.

The managers pronounce the mine a total loss, considering it too impossible to pump out the workings in view of the connection not only with the lake, but also with the River Elbe.

HON. MR. HAZEN WILL TAKE THE MATTER UP

Montreal, July 19.—The fisheries department here has under consideration the question of either revising or abrogating the agreement with the United States entered into many years ago in regard to the fisheries regulations governing the rights and privileges of American fishermen within the three mile limit of Canadian waters. When the agreement was made the United States admitted Canadian fish free of duty. In return Canada granted to the United States fishermen on payment of a license fee of \$1.50 certain privileges with regard to obtaining supplies, making repairs, curing fish, etc., in Canadian ports. Since then the United States has imposed a duty on fish and now the agreement is considered as being all in favor of the United States. When Hon. J. D. Azeff, minister of marine and fisheries, returns from London, the matter will probably be taken up with Washington.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a square section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Office or Subagency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, but the homesteader must be the son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader.

Within six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of the years of the homesteading may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or on a homestead and a farm of at least 80 acres, or on a homestead and a farm of at least 80 acres.

In certain districts a homesteader in lieu of the standing may pre-empt a section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-empted six months in each of six years from date of homesteading (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and desires to pre-empt certain other land must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that at a Common Council held in the City of St. John, on Monday, the Fifteenth day of July, instant, Alderman Agas, Commissioner of Public Works, gave notice that he would, at the first meeting of the said Common Council, held after the lapse of thirty days from the first publication of this notice, as required by law, move the following resolution:

"WHEREAS it is desirable to discontinue that portion of the north-eastern end of Nelson Street, on the West Side of the Harbor, in the City of St. John, described as follows, that is to say: All that portion of Nelson Street, West in Guys Ward, in the City of St. John, on the western side of the Harbor which lies North of the line described as follows: beginning on the Eastern side line of Nelson Street, at the intersection thereof with the line of division between lot 'B' and lot sixteen (16); the said point of intersection being at a distance of two hundred and seventy-eight (278) feet, more or less, measured along the said line of said Street from the intersection thereof, with the northern line of Cross Street, as shown on the plan of Fort Neck prepared by Thomas O'Keefe, and bearing date September 18th A. D. 1855, the said plan being on file in the office of the Common Clerk of the City of St. John, and thence Northwestwardly in a direction at right angles to the said Street Thirty (30) feet; or to the western side line of Nelson street.

THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the portion of Street above described be, and the same is hereby discontinued.

NOW THEREFORE NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that after the lapse of THIRTY days from the first publication of this Notice and after the continuous publication of the same as by law required and at the first meeting of the Common Council held after said lapse of Thirty days after such publication, it is the intention of the Common Council to move the above Resolution for so discontinuing such portion of said Street and that such Resolution will be moved at said meeting.
