

Russia's Long Battle Line



Russian official advices are to the effect that a great battle has begun on a line extending from the vicinity of Warsaw along the Vistula and the San rivers to Przemyśl and the passes of the Carpathians. On the left bank of the Vistula, on the roads leading from Warsaw and Ivangorod the Russians have repulsed advanced German detachments. To the south of Przemyśl the Russians are battling with the renovated Austrian army, and, according to Austrian reports, have abandoned their advance into Hungary through the Carpathians.

ANTI-GERMAN RIOTING ON IN LONDON

Several stores and houses looted by angry mobs headed by dock laborers.

London, Oct. 18.—Anti-German rioting occurred in London during last night.

Nearly a dozen shops were wrecked. Damage was done in the Deptford Borough and in Old Kent Road. In the former district several stores were attacked, and one was set afire. In Old Kent Road meat markets were smashed and the wreckage of a confectionery store early this morning. Some of the shops were pillaged.

Police were called out and twenty arrests were made. Precautions have been taken to prevent further rioting.

Great excitement prevailed throughout the night in Deptford and neighboring boroughs. Crowds thronged the streets, and refused to move at the orders of the police and soldiers. In all it was found today that twenty bakeries, butcher shops and saloons were completely wrecked. The rioters threatened to attack German places in Bromley and other boroughs, if the authorities were permitted them to open.

The rioting was led by one hundred dock laborers who had been turned out of a lodging house to make room for Belgian refugees. The men gathered in a German saloon and smashed the windows and the bar. The dockers charged the owner of the saloon with having started a report that two British battleships had been destroyed.

The shop of a German butcher, in the window of which a picture of Emperor William was displayed, was wrecked. The rioting proceeded for a distance of about a mile before it was stopped by a detachment of soldiers.

The shopkeepers all lived above their places of business and their apartments were sacked. Twenty men were captured in one house. They had thrown a piano down the stairway, and the instrument became jammed and held them prisoners.

CHURCH SHOULD BE BUSINESS AS USUAL

General Secretary of Laymen's Missionary Movement delivers powerful sermon—The War and the church.

General Secretary H. K. Caskey of the Laymen's Missionary Movement spoke Sunday in the St. David's Presbyterian and the German street Baptist churches. He said the commercial slogan "Business as Usual" should be adopted by the church which is supposed to be always at war. War time is to the church a testing time and a time of unusual opportunity. The Devil is doing business as usual and he saw seven young men enter a bar-room last week on one swing of the door: at the Woodbine recently held in one day and 10,000 people attended in one race. Young men holding positions of trust and responsibility frequently gamble all Saturday night, and on Sunday morning, staking their entire week's earnings, and the church is failing absolutely to interest or hold thousands of them. The church's charter to preach the Gospel to every creature is attractive because it means life and it knows no personal, geographical nor time limits. The glory of the work of the Belgian army was that they tackled a work they knew was too big for them and the church is never at her best unless she is wrestling with a job too big for her powers unaided. The stagnant church is the one that is troubled with heresy. Every church member should be doing work in St. John and to the ends of the earth.

GALLANT MEN MENTIONED IN DESPATCHES

General French forwards recommendations of divisional commanders—British cavalry superior to enemy.

London, Oct. 18, 9.35 p. m.—Gen. French in his report to the Minister of War, gives a long list of officers non-commissioned officers and men who have been recommended for special mention by army corps commanders and heads of departments. General French expresses his agreement with these recommendations, and draws attention to the valuable service rendered by General Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien, Sir Douglas Haig and William Pulteney, commanders of the first, second and third corps respectively.

Of Major General E. H. Allenby and Hubert De La P. Gough, General French says:

"The undoubted superiority which our cavalry has attained over that of the enemy has been due to the skill with which they have turned to best account the qualities inherent in the splendid troops they command."

Mention is also made of General Sir David Henderson, commander of a flying corps; General Sir Archibald Murray, chief of staff, and other officers.

Captain Frederick Edward Guest, of the East Dorset Regiment, who married Amy Phipps, daughter of Henry Phipps of New York; Lt. Col. H. C. Lowther, of the Scots Guards, former secretary to the Duke of Connaught, Governor General of Canada; Capt. T. R. Traill, well known as a polo player; Lt. Prince Maurice, of Battenberg, and Major Prince Arthur of Connaught also come in for honorable mention.
