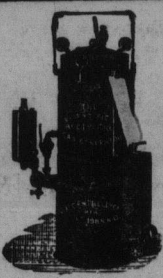

RETURNS ARE
NOT AS GOOD**

In Whole Province but 61 Men were Enlisted Last Week as Against 64 Week Before—St. John Leads.

**GRAND TRUNK BUILDS
BIG NEW CAR SHOPS
FOR WESTERN LINES.**

Montreal, Nov. 27.—The Grand Trunk Railway has undertaken the construction of a new plant at Port Huron, Michigan, for the repair of freight and passenger cars.

The principal car repair plant for the line, west of St. Clair river has been at that point for many years, but was destroyed by fire during the winter of 1914-1915. The old plant was of limited capacity, and located at what was the old terminus of the line previous to the construction of the tunnel under the St. Clair River. After the fire negotiations were carried on between the town of Port Huron and the railroad, resulting in the acquisition of the property recently vacated by the Port Huron Thresher Company, which property is very much more advantageously situated, being near the new tunnel line.

The plant will consist of a power house containing 6 150 H. P. boilers serving double turbo steam generating units of 300 K.W. for developing the electric power for lighting and operation of machines, all of which will be motor driven; a passenger car shop of two units, 135 feet by a combined length of 645 feet, accommodating 27 modern passenger cars. Between the two units will be a transfer table 30 feet in length; a freight car shop 100 x 360 feet accommodating 70 freight cars; a cabinet shop, two floors each 73x250 feet; a blacksmith and machine shop 150x300 feet; a wood mill, 90x210 feet; a dry lumber shed, 47x147 feet; a storehouse, 67x164 feet; an office building, 61x64 feet.

These buildings, including trackage, will occupy a space of approximately 55 acres, and are arranged for economical operation, special attention having been given to this feature to ensure maximum efficiency. The total cost is estimated at \$700,000.

HEAR BILLY SUNDAY**

Principal of Nahant High School Struck by Automobile—Driver Charged with Manslaughter.

Boston, Nov. 27.—While on his way to a Billy Sunday meeting John D. W. Chester, principal of the Nahant High School, was struck by an automobile on Huntington avenue and killed. The body was not identified until 15 hours later. Herbert I. Lohrop, driver of the car, is charged with manslaughter.

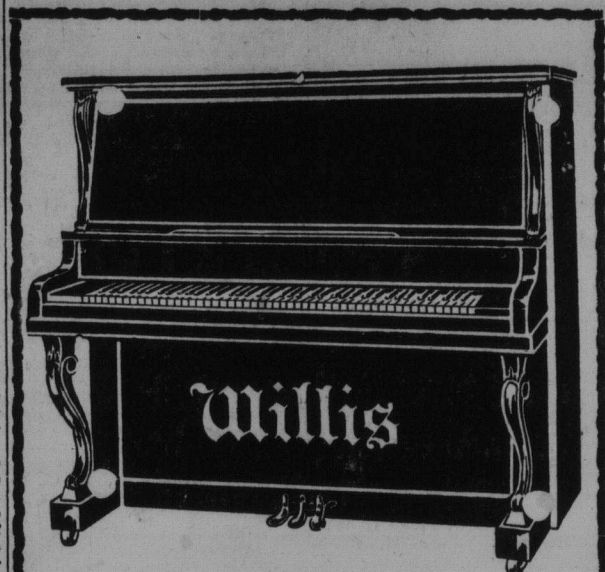

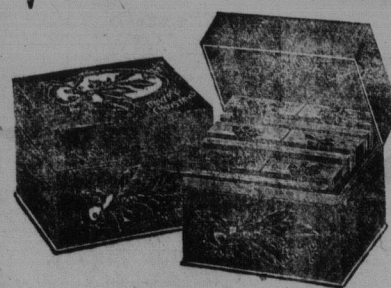
