THREAT TO PEACE OF EUROPE

President Wilson Tells Members of Congress That Geographical Situation Gives Some Countries Right of Armament.

Washington, Feb. 27.—Details of the president's conference last night continued to develop today in the discussions between the White House guests and other members of Congress. One of the developments was the apparent certainty that the president does not wish an administration of the house will not endeavor to secure any formal expression at the time of the tentative draft. No resolution of endorsement therefore is expected now to be brought before the Senate.

While discussing the armament provisions of the league's constitution the president was asked the reason for the clause referring to consideration being given a country's geographical situation in determining its armed forces. He is said to have answered that the clause referred chiefly to France, whose people feared Germany might become strong some time in the future and again threaten invasion. In this connection the question was asked if the proviso might not also help Great Britain in retaining its great navy and the president answered that might be the result because of the wide distribution of the British colonies.

The president is understood to have said Germany was the only menace to European peace and that no war in Europe was possible for twenty years at least because of the exhaustion of the countries.

BOLSHEVIK FAIL IN THEIR ATTACK

Counter Attacks in Newly Gained Allied Position on Murmansk Front Were Futile.

Archangel, Wednesday, Feb. 26. (By the Associated Press)—Bolshevik troops on Monday attempted a counter-attack against the newly-gained Allied positions on the Murmansk front, but were repulsed with heavy losses. The Bolsheviks used an armored train in their ineffectual attempt.

The quiet on the sector south of Archangel was broken on Monday when a Bolshevik airplane dropped a bomb near the American positions on the Volodga Railway. All other sectors of the Archangel front continue to be comparatively quiet as they have been for a fortnight.

That Element Prevents Country from Full Co-operation With Her Allies.

That Italy is anxious to work in harmony with the allied nations, and her boundary problems are not of her own making, but of the Croatian, Slovenian and Bosnian element in the new Jugo-Slav nation, are statements by Charles Upson Clark, American academy in Rome, who speaks at the City club Wednesday night.

Mr. Clark's father was an old Milwaukee newspaperman, later managing editor of The Springfield Republican and for the last twenty years of his life on The New York Evening Post. Mr. Clark has been assistant professor of Latin, Yale university since 1914. He is now touring the United States, speaking on Italy's part in the war.

Wrong Impression Given.

"A controlling element in the new Jugo-Slav nation is trying to give the impression that Italy is attempting to keep them off the Adriatic coast," Mr. Clark said. "Nothing could be farther from the truth. It is well for us to know that the Jugo-Slavs were presented by Italy with a wealth of Adriatic harbors in the Pact of London, at a time when all the Jugo-Slavs, except the Serbs, were the bitterest fighters against the entente. In the Pact of London, April, 1915, Italy yielded every Dalmatian harbor below and including Fiume, except Zara and Sebenico. The harbor of Cattaro alone would hold the entire naval and commercial fleet of the United States.

Jugo Slavs Antagonistic.

"But the Jugo Slavs are made up of three formerly antagonistic elements: The Greek orthodox Serbs, for whom the Italians have the highest regard; the Mohammedan Bosnians, and the Roman Catholic Slovenes and Croats. The Slovenes and Croats have seized control of the new Jugo Slavia. For generations they have been the bitter enemies of Italy. Until the signing of the armistice they were the bitterest troops in the cause of Austria, and in the convention in which the new Jugo Slav nation was formed they voted gold medals to the regiments that fought most successfully for Austria, and put in charge of their new army Gen. Boroevich, untrusting enemy of the allied troops.

Spread False Propaganda.

"Those who know these facts," Mr. Clark declared, "will understand much of the hostile gossip about Italy's imperialistic ambitions. It is a false propaganda spread by the Slovene and Croat elements, as the Jugo-Slavs spread rumor in America about Italy's unwillingness to demobilize."

"Italy," continued Mr. Clark, "has the same demobilization problems as the other warring nations. For a while Italy intends employing the soldiers on a number of national enterprises. And still another is the completion of the railway from Rome to Ostia. Another is the electrification of railways. And still another is the completion of the great Apulian aqueduct, over 1,000 miles long."

Mr. Smith is the owner of a portable mill operating in this section.

Hoyt Station, Feb. 26.—Mr. Frank F. Knorr, of Mill Settlement, died on February 15, 1918, at his home in that place. Mr. Knorr had been sick for a long time and yet his death was a shock to many that knew him. He leaves to mourn his going a wife, also two sons and one daughter, in childhood. Mr. Knorr was still a young man. He was born in St. John, in the year 1874, and passed to his rest at the age of 44 years, 11 months and 23 days. Mr. Knorr was a farmer and a much respected citizen, and his going will be missed in the community of which he lived. While not a member of the church he was a regular attendant and supporter of the United Baptist church of Mill Settlement.

The funeral took place on Monday, February 17th, at the Mill Settlement United Baptist church at 2.30 p. m. and was largely attended by his many friends and relatives. Rev. Wm. J. Richardson, the United Baptist pastor on the field, attended the funeral.

Leola F. Craig.

FOR BRITISH Staggering Figures on Mortality Given Out by Advocate of the Bill.

London, Feb. 27.—(British Wireless Service)—In the last four years about 100,000 of the pick of the British race was lost on the battle field, declared Dr. Christopher Addison, president of the Local Government Board, in moving in the House of Commons, Wednesday, the second reading of the bill to create a Ministry of Health, and in October, November and December of last year the mortality from influenza in the United Kingdom was as high as the average monthly losses during the war from war causes. Under the terms of the bill, the Minister said, the various health and insurance bureaux, which are now connected with the local government board, the Home Office, and the Ministry of Pensions the poor law it was proposed to disentangle sickness from destitution. Dr. Addison said he was prepared to make the bill applicable to Ireland as far as he could.

INTO TROUBLE Fredericton Has Signs of In- toxication Occasionally— U. N. B. to Entertain—Lt. Col. Guthrie to Arrive Home March 4th.

Fredericton, Feb. 27.—Lieut.-Col. Percy A. Guthrie and Lieut.-Col. Geo. W. Newson, have sailed from England for this country and are expected to dock at Portland, Me., about March 4th.

About four hundred people are to be expected at the victory conference at the University of New Brunswick tomorrow. This is the first real social function to be held with the University of New Brunswick since war was declared, and promises to eclipse anything in that line held for many years. The affair is in the hands of a committee of which the secretary is A. D. Foster, son of Premier Foster, St. John.

Lieut.-Col. G. W. Williams, of Toronto who is in charge of the military service in Eastern Canada, is here looking into the service so far as it relates to the district depot in this city.

Last evening a soldier, who was pretty well under the influence of liquor, was seen loitering around the street corner and appeared to go home. He proceeded to a local livery stable to obtain a horse, and left there with one other man, a civilian, who was also under the influence of liquor. The two drove down Queen Street and entered Chancery Lane, where they tied the horse. Chief of Police Pinney and Policeman Murray found them in a house occupied by colored women. The back door of the building was fastened, so one of the officers stayed there, while the other entered the house. The civilian was caught with a bottle of liquor in his possession, which was seized by the police. The two men were locked up over night, and the horse was returned to the stables.

This morning the two appeared before Magistrate Limerick and the soldier was remanded until Monday for a hearing. They proved to be very uncommunicative and would give no evidence. The civilian pleaded not guilty but was convicted on evidence of the Chief of Police and Policeman Murray. He was given a fine of \$100 or three months in jail.

SITUATION WORSE IN BARCELONA

Madrid Government Requested to Send Forces of Men Necessary to Meet Conditions—Revolutionary League Defiant.

Madrid, Feb. 27.—The situation in Barcelona has grown worse and the authorities here have requested the Madrid government to send forces of men necessary to meet the situation. It is reported that a revolutionary force has been formed in Barcelona with the purpose of cutting the water mains and electric cables. Wednesday night troops patrolled the city which was in complete darkness.

NEW YORK NORMAL SCHOOL BURNED

Cortland, N. Y., Feb. 27.—The New York Normal School was destroyed by fire today. The institution was preparing to celebrate the centennial of its founding. The fire is thought to have started near the heating boilers. Three hours after the fire was discovered all that was left of the school was a mass of broken walls and ruins. There was \$150,000 insurance carried on the building.

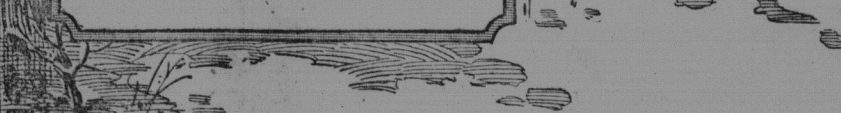
