GERMAN SHIPS SURRENDERED.

Paris, Sept. 26.—Germany had surrendered 1,941,565 gross tonnage of steamers and sailing vessels, by Sept. 16, according to the reparations commission. She has thus delivered virtually all the tonnage unquestionably due under the treaty except some vessels under construction or repair and the vessels in the Schleswig district held pending the plebiscite decision.

Fair and Warmer Has Been Located

Horse Which Disappeared a Week Ago Will Race Tomorrow.

Montreal, Sept. 26.—The Montreal Standard has been authorized to state that the mystery horse Fair and Warmer, which disappeared from Blue Bonnets track between Tuesday and Wednesday, a week ago, has been located within a radius of five miles of Montreal.

Not only that, but upon the authority of D. N. Nicholson, of the law firm of Nicholson & Plante, it is permitted to say that the horse will race in Toronto on Tuesday next.

According to Mr. Nicholson, one of the main reasons why the horse was taken away was to prevent it from taking part in Tuesday's race, which is for a purse of five thousand dollars. It seems that Fair and Warmer could be returned to its owner at any moment now, but it is considered advisable to delay taking possession of the animal till the three men for whom warrants will be sworn out in connection with its disappearance are apprehended, which is expected at almost any time.

Toronto Man Bike Champion

Arthur Spencer Crowned 1920 Winner of United States at Newark, N. J.

Newark, N. J., Sept. 26.—(By Canadian Press).—Arthur Spencer, Toronto, was this afternoon crowned 1920 bike champion of the United States, when he was presented with a horseshoe of flowers and a crown of laurels, emblematic of his title. Twenty-five thousand people witnessed the ceremony, which took place before the two-mile championship race, and which Spencer entered with a point score of 43. His nearest rival was Ray Eaton, who had but 17 points.

Columbus, Sept. 26.—Saturday's Grand Circuit programme consisting of three races was a cheap card that was featured by the pacing of Northers Direct in the 2.11 pace. This stallion, owned by the Silver Spring Farm, Goshen, N. Y., came west almost unknown and his backers cleaned up on him nicely. He sold around \$100 to \$20 for the field in most tickets. His first heat in 2.03 1/2 was paced in a jog at the finish. In his final mile he again stepped in 2.03 1/2, the fastest time of the three heats.

Crex, an outsider, won from Virginia, the favorite in the 2.20 trot. The time of the first heat, 2.11 1/2, was the slowest of the meeting so far.

Comet, selling for \$50 in tickets worth \$25, out-trotted Bovo, the heavily played favorite, who was unsteady and handily won the 2.09 trot.
