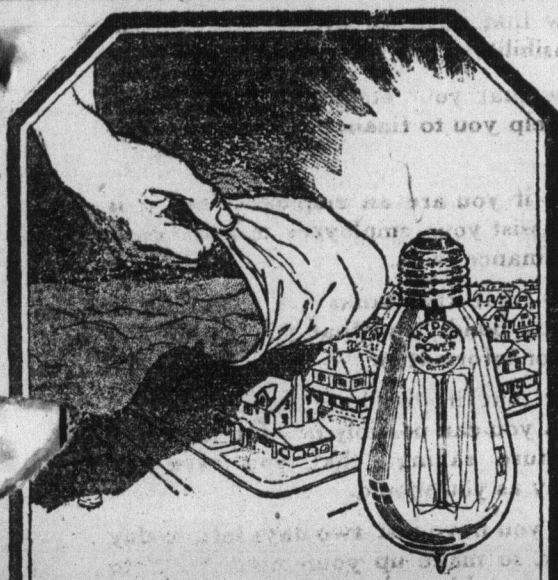

Jacob Palm underwent an operation at the Walkerton Hospital a week ago Tuesday for the removal of part of the breast-bone and rib which was in a decayed condition.

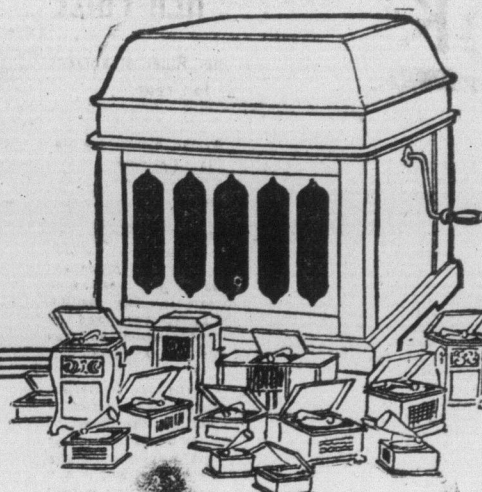
