ENGINEERS ATTACK DEMONSTRATORS

TORONTO (CUP) -- More than 100 University of Toronto engineers hooted, jeered, shoved, and threw snowballs Thursday (Jan. 18) as 300 demonstrators marched up and down in front of the Galbraith Building protesting recruiting by companies supplying materials for the war in Viet Nam.

The demonstrators started gathering across the street from the building at 1:00 p.m. The engineers filled the plaza on the other side of the street, waiting for the protest to start.

"One, two, three," they chanted, and let fly with snowballs. "Kill Faulkner, kill them all."

Tom Faulkner, student council president, and a moderate supporter of the anti-war movement, suggested the protestors disperse unless the police ar-

The more radical demonstrators agreed they would cross the street and carry on with their plans. Faulkner and David Nitkin, a council representative, crossed the street and pleaded for restraint.

"We are in favor of the same thing as you are free discussion. Will you stand back and let us

Engineers pelted the two with snowballs. The initial violence died after the first fifteen minutes when several demonstrators were hurt. A self-appointed group of marshalls from among the engineers helped to hold the shoving engineers back from the sidewalk.

Dean James Ham of the faculty of Engineering exhorted his engineers: "Please, in the name of decency, step back and let them have their fun." Demonstrators handed out leaflets which appealed to engineers not to apply for jobs with companies which are supplying war materials to the U.S. for

Engineers grabbed the leaflets and started burning them. They also snatched signs and tore them. The demonstrations broke up after an hour. Faulkner asked the students to follow him to an

use in Viet Nam.

open forum in Convocation Hall at which the issue would be debated. "Let us try to preserve some of the integrity we've lost today," he said.

About 500 attended the debate. Only one Toronto policeman was on the scene

during the protest. PRAIRIES TO EJECT CYC?

OTTAWA (CUP) - - Company of Young Canadians head Alan Clarke had no comment Friday (Jan. 19) on press reports that CYC volunteers would be asked to leave the three prairie provinces,

He said he first wanted to study texts of the premiers' statements.

At a Thursday (Jan. 18) press conference in Regina, it was revealed that the premiers of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Alberta will soon ask Ottawa to withdraw the volunteers.

Premier Manning of Alberta said they were concerned about the CYC's incredible waste of money, and about agitators and radicals among the volunteers. He conceded some were dedicated, but that others had no contribution to make.

Saskatchewan Premier Ross Thatcher and Manning both said their province's youth agencies will take over the CYC work.

But CYC assistant director Stewart Goodings told us the Alberta youth program is at present a summer project, and could not hope to do the things the CYC

FEKETE'S CASE APPEALLED

MONTREAL (CUP) - - The case of John Fekete, the McGill student who is challenging the university's right to discipline him, has been taken under advisement by a panel of five judges of the Quebec Court of Appeals.

Earlier, a judge had turned down a writ to lift Fekete's case from the jurisdiction of the university body to a regular court of law.

Counsel for the university argued granting such a writ would have the effect of "subjecting any body politic corporate which sets up a discipline committee" to the jurisdiction of the courts.

Fekete's original case was heard by Mr. Justice Jean St. Germain in December. The Judge ruled there was no evidence to suggest Fekete would not be treated according to the laws of "natural justice" by the university body.


This year, Brock is playing guard for Dal. He is one of the reasons Dal has been so successful to

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
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
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
