

"Special cable to our office — We received a cable message from Mr Joske, director of the Canadian Whiffon Supply Company of Vancouver ~~on the 27th~~ 9.40 pm of the 27th inst. All emigrants completed their landing on the 26th inst. Have not any houses to stay in, cannot get any work, were sent out of the city about 12 miles, white men excited about it. \$25 collected for support and other expenses, the emigrants had to do this." In the letters and cables sent to ^{by Mr Joske & Mr Joske} Japan, there are frequent references to the trouble which their immigration from Hawaii was giving them, and the hope expressed that the ~~the~~ Government in Japan might be able to do something to put a stop to it. The following for example is a copy of ^{cable} ~~letter~~ sent by Mr Joske to the Whiffon branch of the Canadian Whiffon Supply Company.
