- 62. The Minister of Trade and Commerce said that the project of the applicants was going ahead under abnormal conditions. A large proportion of items could not be secured in Canada due to the special demands of the moment. In the case of a development of this sort it did not appear that the government should profit from such unusual circumstances.
- 63. The Minister of Justice remarked that, while assistance had been given to projects such as railway construction, it had normally been by way of subsidy. The average person could appreciate the reasons for a subsidy but was not so likely to approve of exemptions accorded to large companies which were not available to smaller concerns.
- 64. The Minister of National Defence pointed out that special concessions were allowed for mining equipment. In the case of the Labrador development, all the items were for development of the mine and exemptions could be regarded as an equivalent of the arrangements for mining equipment.
- that, in connection with development of iron ore deposits on the Quebec-Labrador boundary, exemption be accorded to the extent of 100 percent of customs duties on production materials entering into the project other than materials required for the townsite but that no exemption from sales taxes be granted; details of a proposal to this effect to be prepared by the Minister of National Revenue and submitted for consideration at a subsequent meeting.
