to give to; and their interest will be in proportion to the mount of in formation they have regarding it. They may give largely once, on the spur of the moment, under the impulse of some strong appeal; but they will only get into the habit of giving from a rational interest based on ample knowledge. The greatest need of the Church to-day is more general, more accurate, more ample information regarding the obligation, the opportunities, the problems, and the necessities of the missionary enterprise. To meet this need a wide and vigorous campaign of education must be carried out. The annual missionary sermon, to be followed by "spasm" of an annual collection, is entirely out of date. Archbishop Temple used to urge his clergy preach at least twenty missionary sermons a year. It may even be maintaine that every sermon should have a missionary outlook and application. A frequent missionary sermon, entirely apart from the idea of a collection, is imposed on the clergy by the urgency of the missionary question and by the vastness and variety of the missionary problem. The Missionary Committee can do -13---
