GIRDLES and belts of various styles and colors are a very prominent style feature this season. A new style of belt to wear with a shirt waist and skirt is one of suede leather which is wide enough to wrinkle around the waist and comes in various shades. Very plain plaid girdles are especially suitable for wearing with dark dresses. A serge dress and a new style of girder which will no doubt receive considerable favor this summer is one made of colored ratine to be worn with white dresses. It is made plain with pointed front and fastens in front with round white buttons.

If something for special wear is desired, there are various styles of soft girdles fashioned in satin with a large bow either in the back or front, or some are made of chiffon gathered in the folds and lined with silk lining and trimmed with fancy buttons. We believe that some of these girdles might be worked out in fashioning some of the styles we are showing this week.

A pretty crook for the young girl is shown in design 9842. This desirable model will be most becoming to the growing girl and especially to slender figures. The shaped fronts line a vest that may be of self or contrasting material. The skirt is a three-piece model. A soft girder of contrasting material would make a pleasing finish for this frock. Five sizes: 8, 10, 12, 14 and 16 years.

In spite of its simplicity, model 9835 is attractive and will develop effectively in almost any of the new dress materials now in vogue. The fronts are shaped and crossed, the clinging being at the left side. The skirt is plaited below a wide belt. Four sizes: 4, 6, 8 and 10 years.

In model 9407 we have a simple practical garment for the small girl which completely covers the dress and pinafore. Five sizes: 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10 years.

A design of one-piece corset cover that is very simple and easy to make is illustrated in model 9821. It can be fashioned in round, square or

shaped neck. It is suitable for all over embroidery, for lawn, batiste, cambric, nainsook or crepe. Any desired trimming may be used. Six sizes: 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42.

A suitable and seasonable style of lady's skirt, with or without tulle, is featured in No. 9820. For special occasions marquisette, crepe or soft silk could be used, while for more practical wear serge, velvet, cashmere, broad cloth or corduroy are appropriate. The draped portion of the tulle gives length to the figure. Six sizes: 22, 24, 26, 28, 30 and 32 inches waist measure.

Very pleasing and unique is the waist model shown in No. 9826. It has been suggested that this style be fashioned in canton crepe in the new shade of brown. The vest could be of burnt orange satin and the chemise of white chiffon embroidered in gold silks. Cording in brown and gold trims the free edges of the waist and a girder of brown crepe finished with gold buckles completes a most attractive effect. Of course this style is equally suitable for other materials as well.

The neat and serviceable model of a lady's house dress shown in design 9827, is cut of popular and becoming lines. The fronts show a neat tuck below the collar. The neck is finished with tin revers. The skirt is cut on simple lines, being gathered at the waist line in the back. Six sizes: 32 to 42 inches bust measure.
