Outstanding bonds of the Dorchester amo to about \$760,000, and the share capital consists of common and \$42,000 preferred stock.

The value of the Dorchester undertaking to Shawinigan is this, that the company holds a ten-year lighting contract with the city of Quebec, which offers difficulties under existing conditions, and other contracts of some importance to a new company enter ing the field. For Shawinigan to use these contracts to advantage, it will be necessary to build a transmission line from Shawinigan, the cost of which would not be less than \$1,500,000.

The Three Rivers Traction Co. promoted by the Shawinigan interests, as anounced recently in the Gazette, has secured a 20-year tramway franchise in Three Rivers. That, followed by the Quebec deal, will be taken as an indication that Shawinigan has a definite scheme of expansion in view, and a scheme As a Result City is Not Feeling Pinch which has probably been given an impetus by the completion of the Cedars Rapids plant.
