

ABSORBENT BLISTER FOR THOROUGHPIN.

Some few years ago I saw a prescription in your paper for thoroughpin. I got it filled, and made \$75 on sale of my horse, but have forgotten quantities of drugs. Will you kindly send in next issue? The drugs were: Biniodide of mercury, and, I think, potassium iodide, and water. I would be much pleased to have it again.

Ans.—Probably this is the prescription you saw: Three drams each of biniodide of mercury and potassium iodide, and six ounces of water. Clip off the hair and apply. After four or five applications, cease for a week or ten days till the soreness passes away, and repeat. This is an absorbent blister, and will not make the part very sore. If necessary, repeat the treatment four or five times.
