ULSTER GOVERNMENT

(Continued from Page 1)

Mr. Walker Long, formerly Unionist Chief Secretary for Ireland, on behalf of the Unionists threw down a challenge to Premier Asquith to submit Home Rule to a vote of the country. The plea made by the King in his speech "to heal dissension" found little echo in Mr. Long's advocacy of the case for the Unionists of Ulster. He asked the House of Commons squarely to fact the fact that for the first time in centuries the United Kingdom was threatened with civil war. The attitude of the Unionists, he said, was the same as it had been since 1886. In no circumstances would they stultify themselves by accepting a measure to which they were root and branch opposed. There were, said Mr. Long, 100,000 men training in Ulster and prepared to sacrifice their lives in resisting the Home Rule Bill and as the first fruits of the Parliament Act if the Govern- ment carried it the effect would have to be the use of British bullets and bayonets.

Mr. Long ridiculed the talk of the supremacy which the Imperial Parlia- ment would have over the Irish leg- islative body. Before the Government took a step fraught with such con- sequences it should consult the coun- try, and he concluded his remarks by moving an amendment to the effect that in the opinion of the House it would be disastrous to proceed further with the Government for Ireland Bill until the measure had been submitted to the judgment of the country.

As Mr. Long resumed his seat, Pre- mier Asquith arose and addressed the House. Reviewing the course of the Home Rule Bill up to the present in his ad- dress to Parliament yesterday, Pre- mier Asquith pointed out that it had been twice passed with sustained ma- jorities by the House of Commons and would automatically become law this year. He argued that the votes at the bye-elections since Aug- ust had shown increased approval of the Government's policy.

Without delay the Government would, said Mr. Asquith, submit to the House of Commons suggestions which would be put forward honestly in the hope of overcoming all ob- jections. The Prime Minister held the sug- gestion of a dissolution of Parliament to be futile. He said it would simply lead to a condition of deadlock. If the Unionists won they would be confronted with the problem of cov- ering four-fifths of Ireland. He pointed out the ease of the fruition of long cherished hopes. If the Liberals were returned, would Ulster lay down its arms?

Mr. Asquith expressed deep regret that the conversations between An- drew Bonar Law, the leader of the Opposition, and himself had re- sulted in an agreement, but he said he did not despair. He thought the language of the King's speech from the throne would find an echo in every quarter of the house and then continued: "Speaking for myself and for my colleagues, I will use no last word in this matter. Settlement schemes and suggestions of settlement are in the air. The exclusion of Ulster has been suggested. I am not going to pro- nounce any final judgment on this or any other solution."

The Premier added that those sug- gesting the exclusion of Ulster re- garded it in the nature of a last re- sort. Mr. Asquith said he would welcome the scheme proposed by Sir Horace Lunnkett for a plebiscite to be taken after a certain number of years in order to ascertain whether any section of the Ulster desired to continue sub- ject to the Irish Parliament, but he did not expect it would be acceptable to the opponents of Home Rule. The Premier proceeded: "It is for the sake of maintain- ing peace and as the price of peace that my suggestion will make will be brought forward. By peace I do not mean the avoidance of civil strife, I mean that it is possible any new system of Irish government will start under such conditions and in such an atmosphere as to give it every fair chance of working successfully."

"The Government believes it to be its duty—and it is a duty it will en- deavor to perform—to put forward suggestions which it believes will be regarded by all fair-minded men as at any rate an attempt to arrive at such an agreement as will consoli- date not only the interests but the sus- ceptibilities of all concerned. As far as I and my colleagues are concerned we will not close any ave- nue, however unpromising, the en- durance thereto may appear, which directly or indirectly holds out any hope of leading to concord and a set- tlement."

FOUR DAYS FOR THE SUFFRAGETTES

Sentences Were Handed Out at Bow Street Police Court Today.

LONDON, Eng., Feb. 11.—Seven militant suffragettes were sentenced by the magistrate at Bow street station to four days imprisonment, each on their refusal to find sureties that they would keep the peace for six months after they had been charged with obstruction and assault in connection with last night's attempt of the police to arrest Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst. The women informed the magistrate their demonstration of yesterday was a protest against the exclusion of the question of votes for women from the King's speech at the opening of parliament. There were no leaders among the prisoners. Another batch of militant suffra- gettes were brought up at the West London police court on charges of assaulting the police during the at- tempt to arrest Mrs. Emmeline Pan- khurst last night. Some of the wo- men were sent to prison for a week on their refusal to pay small fines inflicted by the magistrate while others were discharged or remanded pending inquiries.

A force of police kept close watch all night on the house in Kensing- ton where Mrs. Pankhurst took up her residence on her arrival from Switzerland. Large quantities of pro- visions had been laid in there during the past two days and this was be- lieved to indicate that the militant leader was preparing for a long siege.
