## GREAT NAVAL BATTLE IN NORTH SEA

### British Losses Heavy

London, June 2—A great naval fight took place off Denmark on May 31st. It was a battle between big German warships and a British cruiser squadron. The heavy guns did much damage to our small squadron sinking many.

### British Admiralty Statement

London, June 2—The text of the admiralty announcement follows:

"On the afternoon of Wednesday, the 31st of May, a naval engagement took place off the coast of Jutland. The British ships, on which the brunt of the fighting fell, were the battle-cruiser fleet and some cruisers and light cruisers, supported by four fast battleships. Among these the losses were heavy. The German battle fleet, aided by low visibility, avoided a prolonged action with the main forces. As soon as these appeared on the scene the enemy returned to port, though not before receiving severe damage from our battleships.

"The battle-cruisers Queen Mary, Indefatigable and Invincible and the cruisers Defence and Black Prince, were sunk. The Warrior was disabled, and after being towed for some time had to be abandoned by her crew. It is also known that the destroyers Tipperary, Turbulent, Fortune, Sparrow, Hawk and Ardent were lost, and six others are not yet accounted for. No British battleships or light-cruisers were sunk.

"The enemy's losses were serious. At least one battle-cruiser was destroyed, and one severely damaged. One battleship is reported to have been sunk by our destroyers. During the night attack two light cruisers were disabled and probably sunk. The exact number of enemy destroyers disposed of during the action cannot be ascertained with any certainty, but must have been large."

LONDON, June 3.—The British officially announced last night that the total number of British destroyers lost in the naval engagement was eight. The announcement adds that of three German battle-cruisers, either the Derflinger or Lutzow, was blown up, another was seen to have been disabled and a third to be seriously damaged. One German light-cruiser and six German torpedo boat destroyers were sunk, and at least two more light cruisers were disabled.

An additional British official communication, just issued, says:—

"Since the foregoing communication was issued a further report has been received from the commander-in-chief of the Grand Fleet, stating that it has now been ascertained that our total loss in destroyers amounted to eight boats in all.

"The commander-in-chief also reports that it is now possible to form a closer estimate of the losses and the damage sustained by the enemy fleet.

"One dreadnought battleship of the Kaiser class was blown up in an attack by British destroyers, and another dreadnought battleship of the Kaiser class is believed to have been sunk by gun fire. Of three German battle-cruisers two of which it is believed were the Derflinger and the Lutzow, one was blown up, another was heavily engaged by our battle fleet and was seen to be disabled, and stopping, and the third was observed to be seriously damaged.

"One German light-cruiser and six German destroyers were sunk, and at least two more German light cruisers were seen to be disabled.

"Further repeated hits were observed on three other German battleships that were engaged.

"Finally, a German submarine was rammed and sank."

The latest report about the result of engagement is that the German loss was full heavier than the British. The loss of life is British 4000 German 3000 to 5000.

## OBITUARY

Mr. John Irwin

The death occurred at his home Baxters Harbor early Wednesday morning, May 31st, 1916, of Mr. John Irwin, aged 61 years. He had been around all day Sunday, May 28th in his usual good health but in the evening he was suddenly taken ill. Dr. J. W. Miller was immediately summoned and all that medical aid and loving care could do, was done until death released him from his sufferings.

He leaves to mourn their loss a widow and nine children, five sons and four daughters and nineteen grandchildren. The sons are J. Herbert, Frank L. at Sheffield Mills, William A., at Canning; Arthur M., in the United States; Gordon E., at Port Greville. The daughters are Mrs. Owen Sanford, Kingsville; Mrs. W. McNally, Kingsville; Mrs. Stanley Brown, Halls Harbor and Miss Ruby at home. Also an aged mother, Mrs. Mary Irwin, three brother and one sister, William E., Perea; Gordon L., Brooklyn Corner; Henry in L., Brooklyn, Mass., and Mrs. Harriett Lyons, Upper Perea.

Mr. Irwin was born at Baxters Harbor and had spent all his life there. He was well known and highly respected and his sudden death has cast a gloom over the entire community. The deepest sympathy is felt for the sorrowing relatives.

The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. U. Bell, assisted by Mr. McLennan at his home on Thursday afternoon June 1st. Burial at Canning.

Mr. Daniel Bennett passed away from her home in Arlington, on May 29, aged 37 years. She had been ill but a short time and her death came as a shock to mourn their loss.
