of the field.

The second half reversed conditions, and Darrell was not long in taking advantage of the wind. By fast team work they rushed the sphere to Windsor's goal and scored. The home team took a noticeable brace and affairs were most interesting for every body and both goal-keepers had ample opportunity to prove their metal. About 15 minutes before time was called Darrell scored another. Windsor now was in desperate straits and the boys were playing like Trojans. Excitement among the spectators reached the fever point and it was impossible to keep the yelling, shouting mob of rooters off the field. The locals were having the better of the contest at this stage of the game and many poorly directed was much to blame for the bad shooting, and the contest ended with Dar-rell ahead and in the best position to win the championship of the Peninsular League. Darrell certainly deserves great credit for the true sportsmanship that they have exhibited this full. The team has had innumerable difficulties to surmount but they have overcome every obstable without failure. Three nights a week the boys have practiced, many of the players going miles to play. The next game is to be played next Saturday in Chatham and, although neutral grounds, the Maple City people have never borne any great love for the athletic representatives of Windsor. The locals however, will have a team vastly superior to the one which played in Walkerville Saturday and if they are beaten again Darrell will have to play much harder than they did here. -Windsor Record.
