### A CHAMPAGNE CORK.

It Costs More Than the Wine in the Bottle

The Stopper is Made of the Finest Bark I hat is Grown and its Texture is

To the average lover of champagne the To the average lover of champagne the apparent climax of value is in the fizzy fluid itself. Bottle, cork and label are merely accessories. Yet the fact remains that the original cost of the wine is relatively trifling, and the most expensive part of the whole affair, leaving out the part of the whole affair, leaving out the cost of the expert labor expended in "ripening" the vintage, is the despised and swollen cork. The cork stands for more than the first cost of the wine plus the value of the bottle, wire, label and wrappings. The cork costs 25 cents. All the rest only foots up a fraction under

The champagne cork is the finest bark 18 cents. that is grown. The texture must be flaw-less or the life of the wine will be lost. Then its peculiar shape requires that it shall be fushioned by hand. No machine has yet been invented that will satisfy the champagne cork connoisseur as well as the deft work of nimble fingers. This expenditure of skill and time combines with equality to make these particular bottle stoppers cheap at a quarter apiece.

The young wine, on the contrary, when it goes into the bottle is cheap-16 cents a quart. The value and the flavor come with age. Countless times the bottles must be turned carefully and gently be must be turned carefully and gently be-fore the juice of the grape is fit to tickle the palate of an epicure.

There is a wonderful city in France, the subterranean city of Epernay, into

whose silent streets no ray of sunshine ever steals, where the wine is stored to ripen, guarded as jealously as if it were gold and handled as tenderly as if it were human. Miles and miles of streets are hewn out of the chalky soil and cemented with millions and millions of champagne bottles of all blends and vintages left there to ripen. When the bot-tles went into these underground clois-ters, the cork was king by virtue of its

ters, the cork was king by virtue of its cost. When they return to the world of light and life, the cork has become insignificant in comparison with the wine.

Winehouses frequently pay good prices for corks bearing their mark, thus enabling themselves to gauge accurately the esteem in which various vintages are held by the public. held by the public. Champagne corks, too, have a special value in the tiolet. Their fine texture

makes them peculiarly available in treat-ing the skin with powders or similar applications, and the Parisian or Viennese belle whose toilet set does not contain an assortment of champagne corks is rare. The finest and most perfect specimens only are used for this purpose, and they retail readily at the equivalent of 50 cents each.-Chicago Inter Ocean.

Mark Twain has met the Boer, and this is what he says of him: "He is deeply religious; profoundly ignorant, dull, obstinate, bigoted; uncleanly in his habits: hospitable, honest in his dealings with the whites, a hard master to his black servant; lazy, a good shot, good horseman, addicted to the chase; a lover of political independ-ence, a good husband and father, not fond of herding together in towns, but liking the seclusion and remoteness and solicitude and empty vastness and silence of the veldt; a man of mighty appetite and not delicate about what he appeases it with-well satisfied with pork and Indian well satisfied corn and biltong, requiring only that the quantity shall not be stinted; willing to ride a long journey to take a hand in a rude all-night dance interspersed with vigorous feeding and boisterous jollity, but ready to ride twice as far for a prayer meeting; proud of his Dutch and Huguenot origin and its religious and military history; proud of his race achieve in South Africa-its bold ments plunges into hostile and uncharted deserts in search of free solitudes unvexed by the pestering and detested English; also its victories over the natives and the British; proudest of all of the direct and effusive persona interest which the Diety has always taken in its affairs.

"He cannot read, he cannot write, he has one or two newspapers, but he is apparently not aware of it; until latterly he had no schools, and taught his children nothing; news is a term which has no meaning to him, and the thing itself he cares nothing about. cate complexions and soft pink-andwhite skin. A well known physician of Berlin has made a careful study of this question, and he declares, that the veil is the cause of most of his trouble. He found that where the veil presses against the nose color was most vivid and that when the veil was left off the nose in most instances lost the undue

color that had made it so conspicuous The name of veil-erythema has been coined for this disease which is so fatal to beauty. The remedy consists in discarding veils, as the more the skin is wrapped up the more easily it will become irritated.

Especially will a veil drawn tightly over the nose cause it to assume a carmine hue. Sharp winds or great de grees of cold are apt to send blushes to this member. Care should be taken not to pass from the cold directly into



warm room. A little cold cream applied to the nose, and then talcum powder or starch, is good, as is massage, stroking with two fingures from tip to the root of the nose. The veil devotee who will not dis-

pense with the becoming face cover should wear a half-size veil, which will leave the nostrils uncovered.

If this doesn't do away with the trouble it is generally attributed to another cause—the corset. Tight lacnig will assuredly bring on this disfigurement, and a red nose is a very high price to pay for a slender waist. It is a noticeable fact that women who in-dulges in athletics, and allows the form to expand to its natural proportions, wear their color where it should be, in the cheeks. When the waist is compressed and free circulation impeeded, pressed and free circulation impeded, the blood goes where it must, not where it should, and the result is the bloom on the nose that makes even the prettiest face look ridiculous. When veils and corsets are abolished the nose will not become the most conspicuous feature of the face on the slightest exposure.

Grandma's Fruit Cake.—This cake is to be put together just as written. One cup melted butter, two cups sugar, one teaspoon cloves, one nutmeg and two teaspoons cinnamon, one-half cup molasses, four eggs, the yolks beaten with the above, three cups flower, large half teaspoonful soda, sifted with flour, one pound raisins, one pound currants, stoned, washed and dried the night before, one-quarter pound citron, chopped fine, add one-half cup flour with the fruit; cook four hours or more in a slow oven.

Strawberry Cream.—Sounds like a soda fountain order, doesn't A? And some say it's quite, as refreshing as that gentle fizz. Six ounces of spermaceti, four ounces of white wax, two ounces of glycerine, two ounces of almond oil, two ounces of rose water thirty drops each of oil of neroli, lemon and oil of verbena, and four our of extract of fresh strawberries. Melt the first four ngredients together in a double boiler, mixing with an egg beater. Add the rose water drop by drop and stir constantly while adding the neroli, lemon juice and verbena

A dry process for glove cleaning is as follows, and many who soil their gloves during the season of parties, and who do not wish to spend money on cleaning, will no doubt find it use ful: Lay out the gloves on a clean table or board, then rub them into a mixture of finely powdered Fuller's earth and alum in equal quantities. This will work a dirty color, and should then be brushed off; then sprinkle the gloves with dry bran and whit-ing. Lastly, dust them well. Those who have glove trees will do well to put their gloves on them, instead of laying them out on a table.

How Young People Grow.

The year of greatest growth in boys is the seventeenth; in girls the four-teenth. While girls reach full height in their fifteenth year, they acquire full weight at the age of twenty. Boys are stronger than girls from birth to are stronger than girls from birth to the eleventh year; then girls become superior, physically, to the seventeenth year, when the tables are again turned, and remain so. From November to April children grow very little, and gain no weight; from April to July they gain in height but lose in weight, and from July to November they increase greatly in weight, but not in height. These are the results of over six thousand observations. During the school months children suffer far more from disease, than in vacation. school months children suffer far more from disease, than in vacation, and during school years far more than before or after. Usually, school is far too hard in the lower classes, and the children do not get sufficient muscu-lar strength. Less school work and more physical training until the twelfth year are necessary to make our coming generation strong; and a child should not undergo any severe mental labor.
