### MANY BIG FIRES

Gloucester, Sept. 17.—One of the worst storms that ever occurred in this section passed over here last night. The storm commenced about seven o'clock and continued all through the night. The sky was lit up in every direction from the reflection of fires. Travellers coming in from the west state that there were fires all along the line, one gentleman counting eighteen fires between Chatham and here, a distance of 34 miles. Mr. Neil Galbraith, a short distance east of here, had his barn burnt with all his season's crop. Mr. John Stinson also lost a barn. Mr. Neil Currie, of Chatham, a short distance south of here, had his barn and all his crops burnt. There were a number of other fires, but full reports are not ascertainable at the time of writing.
