

ONTARIO NEEDS HELP

Toronto, July 12.-Discussion of Toronto's civic needs occupied a large place in the deliberations of the Toronto branch, Canadian Manufacturer's Association, at the annual meet-

ronto branch, Canadian Manufacturer's Association, at the annual meeting yesterday.

But the address of the retiring chairman, J. Firstbrook, was the feature of the meeting. While he rejoiced over the great prosperity of the country, he was not by any means satisfied. Industrial expansion had failed to keep pace with the growth of the population and its needs. While imports had increased 231-2 per cent. in nine months exports of Canadian goods had shown only the small increase of 21-2 per cent.

Toronto has shared largely in the general prosperity of manufacturers. She is now second only to Montreal as a commercial and industrial centre. In five years the value of the products of her factories has risen from \$58,000,000 to \$65,000,000.

Toronto had now 1,200 industrial establishments employing 70,000 persons, but there is still a crying need for more skilled labor. A conservative estimate places the number of girls required to the reactories at 10,000, and at least 15,000 additional are required at other points in the province. The number of male mechanics needed is almost incalculable. The Dominion Government, he said, was mainly responsible for this acute situation. The increased cost of living and dearth of suitable homes for workmen was responsible for much of the trouble in the labor situation. The increased cost of this number 300 had arrived to date.

JAPANESE HEAD TAX. No Imposition on Immigrants From Japan.

Ottawa, July 12.—The Hon. T. Nosse, the Japanese Consul-General, has received a telegram from Moriawa, the Japanese Consul at Victoria, B. C., denying that a head tax of \$25 has been imposed on immi-

of \$25 has been imposed on immigrant Japs.

The commercial treaty between Japan and Canada, he said, is working well, and Canada is now exporting more goods to Japan than ever before, especially such lines as flour, condensed milk, agricultural implements, steel, nails and paper. The trade in these is growing fast. The imports have been decreasing lately, partcularly in tea and silk, due to the present high prices and to keen competition.
