TALKS ALL-RED LINE

Lord Strathcona Reaches Montreal and Expresses Views.

Canadian High Commissioner Says the Supreme Importance of the Project Is a Cause of Necessary Delay-Britain Friendly to Canada -Favors Halifax as the Terminal on This Side.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—"Naturally I have to keep in daily touch with the Dominion, and I cannot see but what this present prosperity which we are now enjoying all over the country will continue for several years to come. This is, in fact, but a repetition of what took place in the United States after they had recovered from the effects of their civil war," said Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, who reached the city yesterday morning, accompanied by his daughter, the Hon. Mrs. Howard.

Lord Strathcona compared the position of the Liberal party of England under William Ewart Gladstone, with its radically changed policy under Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, and stated that, although they had not advanced so far as to adopt the preference policy, they were distinctly friendly to the Dominion of Canada.

This, he thought, was clearly manifest, when they readily adhered to the idea of meeting the representative men of the colonies every four years for the purpose of discussing questions of importance to both the Motherland and the colonies, and also when they consented to the principle of what has been named the "all-red line."

Speaking at length on this matter, Lord Strathcona declared that there

Latch Key Tenure in Village Near

Crowaland is in Lincolnshire, five miles from the nearest railway station, and about eight miles northeast of Peterberough, at the confluence of the River Welland and the Catwater drain, less than 100 miles from London.

Crownland, as every one know (although, perhaps, it is better known to our American cousin sightseers than to us), is world famous for the interesting remains of the west front of the once magnificent old mitered Benedictine abbey founded in 714 by King Ethelbald in honor of the hermit St. Guthlac, and is also noted for possessing a Gothic "triangular" bridge.

Crownland boasts, however, another curious and extraordinary feature in the shape of a street of houses which at no distant date belonged—as several of them, in fact, now belong—to nobody but the person who is fortunate enough to hold the key.

These are "keyhold tenures," obtained on the "first come first served" principle, and can be held by the tenant so long as he lives; and on fis demise, providing he leaves no widow or family, the first person to cross the threshold becomes entitled to the house, and no power on earth—so far as the law is concerned—can force him to relinquish his hold; the owner for the time being, however, having no tangible hold over the property in the shape of "script" or security of any kind, cannot will it to any one or sell it.

Houses Cost Little,

In this way the little piece of rough, water logged land eventually was transformed into the semblance of a street of some sixty or seventy rude habitations, most of which had been put up at a cost of a few pounds.

Only about half a dozen of the old houses are left that can still be claimed by this unique procedure, most of the tenements having been replaced by more modern buildings, and the occupiers, being better educated, having under the enfranchisement laws, for a matter of \$15 to \$20, taken out freehold deeds, have become full fledged property owners, and, of course, they can will such properties to whomsoever they please, or even sell or mortgage them.

Attorney-General Foy Directs Investigation of Trenten Voters' Lists.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—Attorney-General Foy stated yesterday that he had instructed the crown attorney of Hastings to take such steps as may be deemed necessary in regard to a complaint made to the Department of irregularities in the preparation of the voters' list.

plaint made to the Department of irregularities in the preparation of the voters list.

It is alleged that the manhood franchise section of the list has been loaded up with 310 names that ought not to be there. These were written into the assessment roll by Peter Pomery, an occasional cierk, at the instance and from a marked voters' list furnished by Mr. G. W. Ostrom, ex.M. P.P., town clerk.

Mr. Ostrom admitted freely the irregularity of what he had done, but denied any intention of political or electoral dishonesty. A comparison of the infiated list with that of the previous year showed that every one of the 310 names improperly inserted had been approved by Judge Deroche at the revision of Dec. 3, 1906, and finally certified to by him Feb. 5, 1907.

Mr. Ostrom explained that this revision completed in February last, had left about 368 names in the manhood franchise part of the list.

No election had been held on this list and he inserted the 310 unauthorized names from it in the list for 1907, adding the 66 names in the assessment roll. He said further that, as the list was to be finally revised in in the presence of representatives of both parties before the county judge, he thought it better to have it printed as near complete as possible; that it would entail less work and less printing to strike off a few not entitled to vote than to virtually reproduce the manhood franchise part by making large additions.

As to the copying of names from the voters' list to the assessment roll, Mr. Ostrom said it was for convenience in reference to the coming revision. In support of his plea of innocent intent, he pointed out that all the names improperly entered on the list printed and exposed in June last were certified to by the judge for the previous year's list in February of this year.

Raisuli Plays That Trump Card In Demanding Negotiation.

Tangier, Aug. 2.—The Government troops under command of Caid Bouchta have renewed operations against the lawless tribes. They surprised the village of Alkala, inhabited by Raisuli supporters, at daybreak and set it on fire. A brief fight ensued, in which many were killed and a large number of prisoners fell into Bouchta's hands.

The commander of the troops offered a big reward to any one delivering over to him Raisuli, dead or alive.

Raisuli's letter to the Sultan's Minister threatening to kill Caid Mac-

Raisuli's letter to the Sultan's Minister threatening to kill Caid MacLean and an urgent message sent to Bouchta, acquainting him with the threat and advising suspension of hostilities, have so far had no deterrent effect on the commander of the Moroccan troops.

It is reported that Raisuli has formulated demands, indirectly involving the dilemma of either destroying the Government's authority or sacrificing Caid MacLean's life.

Raisuli refuses to treat with the Sultan, and insists that Great Britain compel the Moorish Government to accede to his terms and guarantee their execution.

The terms include a demand on the part of Raisuli that he be made governor of the northern tribes. Failing this, he threatens that he will kill Caid MacLean.

The Moors feel that the acceptance of the bandit's terms will lead to anarchy, thus affording an excuse for interference by France.
