### A Tribute to Canada's Premier.

The London Daily Mail of July 20th pays the following very high tribute to Canada's Premier, Mr. R. L. Borden, who, all true Canadians are glad to see, is making such a favorable impression in the Motherland:—  
"The man of the hour in London to-day is undoubtedly Mr. Borden, the Canadian Premier. When Mr. Borden first came here a fortnight ago, one section of the community was rather suspicious of him. Men thought that he would visit us as a party man talking party politics. He has done nothing of the kind. He has proved himself to be a great statesman, and a man of great ambitions and great ideas for the Empire. He has had nothing to say about purely party matters about which Englishmen are acutely divided. He has confined himself to one great issue—the question of Imperial defence, and on that issue he has sounded a note which has rung throughout the Empire. We all know that his visit is charged with the greatest potentialities. Canada's lead in Imperial defence will set the pace for every other part of the Empire. Already, as I write, Australia, South Africa and New Zealand are debating Mr. Borden's ideas, and Mr. Borden himself—quiet, businesslike, unassuming, and retiring—has in a few days won a place in our affections from which it would be hard to remove him."

### Game Laws.

As this month contains the first open season for game, and for the convenience of our readers we publish the Game Law in reference to birds:—  
Woodcock, Wilson Snipe, Blue-winged Duck, Wood Duck.—Open season from Sept. 1 to March 1.  
No person shall kill more than 10 Woodcock in one day.  
Tul, Plover, Curlew, Sand-Piper, Yellow Legs, Beach Birds.—Open season from Aug. 15 to Mar. 1.  
Partridge.—Open season for Partridges, (ruffed grouse), from Oct. 1st to Nov. 31st. No one shall kill more than five in one day.  
Pheasants, Spruce Partridge, etc.—Unlawful to hunt, kill or have in possession at any time, Pheasants, Spruce Partridge, Blackcock Capercaillie or Chucker Partridge.  
Unlawful to have in possession, buy or sell eggs, or injure or destroy the nests, of any native birds.  
The use of any rifle or gun, loaded with bullet, to kill or shoot at wild fowl, is prohibited.  
No person shall set any snare, net or trap for the purpose of catching any bird, or use any pant gun or swivel, or any artificial light or fire-beam, for the capture or destruction of any wild fowl.  
No person shall kill any game bird (except blue-winged duck, wild geese, brant and sea ducks), between sunset and sunrise.  
No person shall have any bird in his possession in close season.  
No person shall kill or take, or have in his possession, dead or alive, any of the small birds or birds of song which frequent gardens, fields or clearings.

### A Crop of Clean Fruit by Proper Spraying.

In looking over the apple crop prospect of the Annapolis Valley, one cannot help but observe the care the apple orchards have had during the present season. Hardly any orchards are to be found but what have been given proper pruning, fertilizing and cultivation.  
Regarding spraying, the most essential end of all, and neglect in evidence, which can be attributed to the comparatively clean apple crop of 1911 even where spraying was neglected, besides several good orchards this year have failed to get results by not applying the spray at the proper time, or in sufficient quantity.  
The part of Prof. Wallace's address at Windsor in 1910 where he said, "It has cost the State of New York hundreds and hundreds of thousands of dollars by not spraying at the right time," can be taken home to a good many staunch fruit growers in Nova Scotia this year. The lack of proper spraying this season will cost the fruit crop of Nova Scotia a good many hundred thousands of dollars. Fortunately there are a few growers who have been wide awake and have got clean fruit. These orchards should be an example to convert the 'doubting Thomases.'  
If there are any who discredit the truth of this statement, let them visit the orchard of Mr. Isaac Chipman of Chipman Corner. This orchard under other management in 1910, hardly produced a barrel of decent apples. Last year it was sold to another party and thoroughly sprayed giving a fair crop of apples and this year it has not only one of the largest crops of apples to be found in Kings county, but about as clean as it is possible to get during a spotted year like the present one. One large fruit grower examined it last week and said he had seen over 1000 barrels, and not one spot on an apple.  
When one comes to reckon up and find it has cost Mr. Chipman less than 15¢ per barrel to get such results, the LOSS to the grower who sends the bulk of his Gravenstein and other varieties prone to spot to the evaporator or cider mill through lack of spraying or not applying at the right time, will be very apparent.  
It applies bring a normal price this fall, Mr. Chipman will get in the neighborhood of \$2,000.00 clear of expenses, which will be between 40 and 50 p. c. on his investment, which can be charged up to the profit side of careful spraying.  
Mr. Chipman has sprayed 5 times with Lime Sulphur and Arsenate of Lead, using a power sprayer at 200 lbs. pressure.  
An Orchard Meeting will be held there early in August. Every one interested in growing better fruit should attend.
