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Three Woodsmen Lose Their Lives in Thursday's Storm

TWO OTHERS ARE MISSING

Dead Are; Joseph Hayse, Renew; Bruff, Admiral's Cove; and Peter Raymond, Goulds

The blizzard which swept over the city and vicinity on Thursday was by far the worst for many winters.

Coming on quite suddenly as it did, many were caught out in the woods and on the country roads proceeding to or from town and three deaths are reported while two other men are missing. All the victims belong to Southern Shore settlements and general sympathy is felt for the relatives and friends of the deceased whose tragic passing has cast a deep gloom over the neighbourhoods to which they belonged.

JOSEPH HAYSE, RENEWS.
 The victims of the storm so far reported are: Joseph Hayse, Renew, aged 18 years; Henry Bruff, Admiral's Cove, aged 60 years, married; Peter Raymond, Goulds, aged 49 years widower.

The story of Hayse's death is contained in messages received by Inspector General Hutchings from Const. Lynch at Renew. Proceeding left his home Thursday morning for the woods and the storm came on before he could return. He apparently wandered about while the blizzard raged in all its fury, and finally he brought up at Ferris station. The station is not used during the winter, owing to the Trepassay branch being closed and young Hayse fatigued and worn out entered the station through a window and it was here that the searchers who organized yesterday morning when he did not return found his frozen body. The young man was only 18 years of age and resided with his parents at Renew.

HENRY BRUFF, ADMIRAL'S COVE.
 The Inspector General was also accompanied by Const. Power of Cape Broyle, that Henry Bruff of Admiral's Cove went into the woods on Thursday morning and was caught in the storm. Failing to return home, search parties went looking for him and his body was recovered yesterday morning some distance from his home. Deceased who was aged 60

Kyle Reports Vessel

A message to the Reid Nfld. Co. this morning from Capt. Stevenson of the Kyle says that the steamer spoke the schooner "R. L. Borden" and gave her provisions. The Borden is owned by S. Harris, Ltd., of Grand Bank, and is inward bound from the other side.

Now that poor Joe Long is snow-bound "somewhere along the line" would it not be the most charitable to do to bring him back home again soon as he gets freed.

All reports from Fogo indicate that Mr. George Grimes is going to make a clean sweep of every section of the district and his featherweight opponent won't be heard of again after the ballots are counted.

Worst Railway Blockade For Season

The storm of Thursday and yesterday the worst for the season along the railway line and the most serious blockade for the winter now exists.

The westbound express that left here Saturday had got no further than Arnold's Cove this morning when it left behind a rotary.

The westbound train which has been trying to get across country for nearly two weeks is not at Mary March, a few miles west of Millertown Junction.

The train left here Thursday morning was stuck between Briggs and Tilton and the work of clearing this part of the line began this morning. Another train for Carbonear went out at the regular time this morning.

Every cut on the main and branch lines has been filled level and in places there are drifts to a depth of 10 to 15 feet.

The *Sable I* sighted the Hollett at 11 o'clock yesterday morning making distress signals and went to her assistance. The vessel had lost her stern and had her rudder case damaged by contact with the ice and after putting food and coal on board the vessel, which was short of both, she was taken in tow and towed during the day. The disabled schooner was picked up about 70 miles from Cape Race and had been brought several miles when at 7 o'clock in the evening the tow line broke. The *Sable I* went back to pick up the vessel again but Capt. Brown informed Capt. Murley that she was leaking so badly they could no longer keep her afloat. It was decided then to take off the crew who, after setting fire to the schooner, transferred to the *Sable I*.

The Hollett was 65 days out from Cadiz bound to Barin with a cargo of salt for her owners, W. & T. Hollett. The crew are Capt. J. M. Brown, O. Staple, R. Taylor, J. Emberley and William Hoban.
