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GOMPERS IN BRITAIN

The visit of Samuel Gompers to Great Britain and France promises to have an important bearing on the war outlook. Not only should it have a steadying effect upon the labor situation in those countries, but it should greatly strengthen the defenses of the Allies against the "peace offensive" which the Germans plainly are going to launch during the winter.

The great American labor leader no doubt will find himself in conflict with not a few prominent labor chiefs in the United Kingdom including even Mr. Henderson, who advocates an international labor conference, and others who, curiously enough, favor the Lansdowne idea of negotiating for peace with Prussian generals around a table in some obscure corner.

American labor will have none of this, and Gompers has made that very plain. For three years it has had an opportunity of studying the fundamental issues of the war as an outsider, and sees them very clearly. And it sees also where the pacifism of such men as Snowden and Ramsay MacDonald would lead the world to.

Mr. Gompers will define the attitude of American labor in such a way as to remove all ground of misunderstanding. That attitude, which is the attitude of President Wilson and the republic as a whole, is simply

that the United States will not negotiate with Germany as long as the Hohenzollerns or the Prussian war party control her policy; in other words, it will not discuss peace with Germany as she is constituted at present.

This purpose was emphasized by a member of President Wilson's Cabinet, who pointed out that no territorial readjustment or other material consideration alone would satisfy his country, and that the republic would carry on the war until its objective had been realized.

That is why Mr. Gompers has steadfastly refused to associate American labor with any international labor conference in which German labor leaders would participate. He knows that German labor leaders are merely so many mannikins manipulated by the German Government who remain smugly satisfied in the background when the German armies are advancing, but who are suddenly trotted into the calcium when the German armies begin to retreat. Furthermore, in this attitude Mr. Gompers will express the dominant sentiment of the people of Great Britain which, as Briton born, he understands very well.

It is our privilege to record the fact that the wooden building next to the Young Block has been shorn back to its proper and legal place on the street line. The job proved to be only a very small one after all, but all the same it took years of agitation and persistent work on the part of the various councils to effect it. The building itself is left standing, a living if somewhat decrepit landmark in the progress of the city.

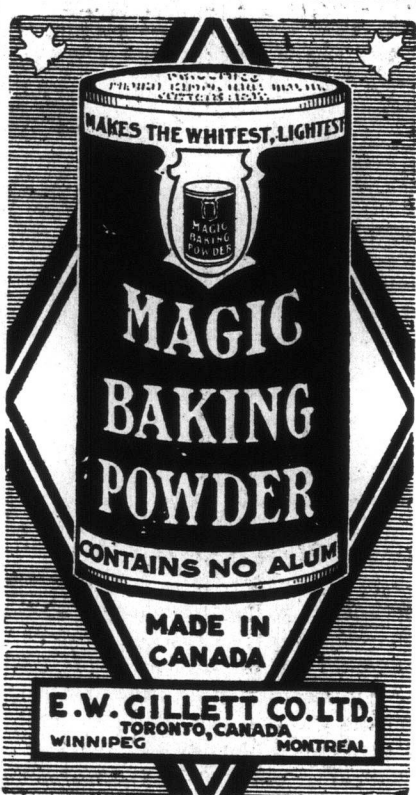
BIJOU THEATRE

MANGANESE FIND A NOTABLE EVENT

laid. He understood that the Munitions Resources Commission had been offered the ore at a figure considerably below the market quotations, and, while no word had yet been received, no doubt steps would be taken without loss of time to utilize the mineral because of its importance for manufacturing purposes under present conditions.

As to the usefulness of manganese the Minister of Mines pointed out briefly that as an iron alloy rich in manganese it was added to steel in making manganese-steel, the toughness and high resisting power of which was well known, and which was essential in the manufacture of big guns, armor and machinery used both in the pursuit of peaceful commercial development and of war.

Questioned as to the prospects of the establishment of an Iron and Steel Industry in British Columbia, Mr. Sloan stated that the offering of a bounty on the production of pig iron in the Province did not seem, so far at any rate, to have had the immediate effect so much desired. There had been no increase in production. Capitalists had shown some interest and still were doing so. Properties were being investigated by private interests but, in spite of these gratifying indications, he was not satisfied.

In his opinion there was an opportunity offering now for the establishment of an industry on the Pacific Coast which would lead to the utilization of the Magnetite Irons of the Province as well as to the material advancement of its commercial interests. Convinced that no time should be lost, and firmly of the belief that with the iron ore resources of the country thoroughly brought home to them capitalists could not hesitate to take its development in hand in earnest, Mr. Sloan said that he had decided to diamond drill a number of the promising properties for the purpose of gaining a definite idea of the tonnage available and also to give those interested a practical demonstration of the possibilities of the industry in question.

His engineers had been carrying out investigations with this work in mind and properties had been selected. He, therefore, was able to announce that contracts would be called for at an early date for the diamond drilling of iron properties and that the work thereon would be proceeded with as expeditiously as possible in order that the information desired could be put before those who might be interested without the loss of time.

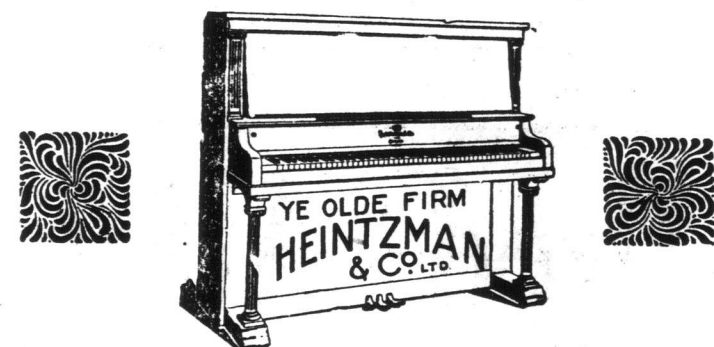
