REPUBLIC FOR PORTUGAL MAY BE NEXT MOVE THERE. Carlos Refuses to Dismiss the Premier and That

May Cost Him His Throne.

Paris, Nov. 25.—Reports representing that Portugal is on the eve of revolution are received here with caution, as dispatches coming directly from that country have ben censored and these indirectly from across the frontier are held more or less under suspicion.
