Reports for October—An Out-turn of Over Five Million Bales Expected. the attention of all foreign Governments should be called to the provisions of the 'Contagious Diseases of Animals Act, 1878,' under which, except in the case of countries specially exempted by the Privy Council in whole or in part from the operation of the Act, all animals landed from abroad in any part of the United Kingdom will, after the 1st of January next, be slaughtered at the port of debarkation. The Lords of her Majesty's Privy Council will require from any countries applying for exemption, (1) a statement of the laws which regulate the importation of animals into that country; (2) of the methods adopted to prevent the spreading of any contagious disease when it exists there; (3) a periodical report on the general sanitary condition of their animals. It is also desirable that their Lordships should be furnished before the lat of November next with such information on the points above referred to as her Majesty's representatives in foreign countries which export animals to the United Kingdom may be able to obtain through the British Consulates."

A Pennsylvania Tewn Destroyed.

PITISBURG, Pa., Oct. 13.—A special from Edenburg, Pa., gives particulars of the destruction of that place by fire this morning. The total loss is estimated at from \$350,000 to \$400,000, largely insured. Two hundred and twenty-five buildings were burned, and the town is almost completely destroyed. There is much suffering among the losers. A rehef committee has been organized, and contributions of food from adjacent towns and farmers in the vicinity are being distributed to the homeless. The principal losers are the Oatwell Supply Company, \$30,000; Travis' livery stable, loss heavy, but unknown; Flynn & Hall, \$18,000; Bennet House, \$12,000; Edenburg House, \$12,000; Edenburg House, \$12,000; Chalfant & Groff, hardware, \$25,000; Exchange Hotel, \$10,000; B. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 12.—The Russians claim that the territory between Constantinople and Adrianople is not affected by the treaty of Berfin, therefore under the preliminary treaty of San Stefano they have a right to occupy it until a definite treaty is concluded.

Sir Henry Wolff, acting on the orders of the English Government, has insisted upon the Treaty of Berlin being carried out in Roumania. The other Commissioners supported him, whereupon the Russian representative yielded. The Commissioners will start for Philippopolis ten days hence. Ministers Layard and Fournier have advised Safvet Pasha to conclude a military convention so as to avert a collision between the Austrians and Turkish troops, leaving the settlement of political questions for future consideration.

Constantinople, Oct. 13.—The Porte has received information that the Russians have commenced marching on Adrianople, presumably from the north. All the foreign military attaches have left Constantinople to verify the intelligence.
