IT appears, says the Mail and Empire, there is a promising market for Canadian cider in Great Britain. If not at present, at all events in the near future, our farmers must make much more out of their orchards than they ever did in the past. The tremendous waste of windfalls is now pretty well saved by the evaporator, which turns to account even the peeling and cores of the poorer apples. The choicer fall apples it will soon be possible to ship to England without loss, through the application of cold storage. All other apples not suitable for drying or shipping can be made into always a good market in England. The economies introduced or now coming into the apple industry should make it a very profitable

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
