Postage to Great Britain—5c per ounce of each article. Registration fee 5c. Money orders granted on all articles order by mail in Canada, United States, Great Britain, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland and India.

Deposits received under the regulations of the post office savings bank between the hours of 9 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Registered letters must be posted 15 minutes before the close of business, 6:30 p.m., Sundays excepted.

FOREIGN POSTAGE.

Canada having been admitted into the Postal Union there is a re-arrangement of postal rates as follows:

For Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Iceland, Egypt, France, Algeria, Germany, Gibraltar, Great Britain and Ireland, Greece, Italy, Liechtenstein, Malta, Montenegro, Netherlands, Norway, Persia, Portugal, Rumania, Roumania, Russia, St. Pierre, Serbia, Spain, the Canary Islands, Sweden, Switzerland and Turkey.

And via United States—Bermuda, Bahamas, Cuba, Danish Colonies of St. Thomas, St. John, St. Croix, Jamaica, Trinidad, Spanish Colonies in Africa, Oceania and America, except Cuba and Porto Rico. Straits Settlements in Singapore, Malacca, Penang, Singapore, Siam, Sulu, and Malacca—Letters 15c. per 100 words, 4c. for 100 words. Other regulations as usual.

West India Islands via Halifax, same rates as formerly. Prepayment by stamp in all cases. Australia, except New South Wales, Victoria, and Queensland—Letters 7c. papers 4 cents.

Australia, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland—Letters 15c. papers 10c.
