THE BOARD OF TRADE.

Reports of Committee on Agriculture Refer the Annual Meeting.

There was a good attendance at the annual meeting of the Board of Trade on Tuesday evening.

REPORT OF COUNCIL. To the Members of the Goderich Board of Trade.

GENTLEMEN.—Another year of the existence of the Board of Trade has passed, and the Council have again the pleasure of submitting to you their annual report.

The business of the town during the last 12 months has, upon the whole, been of a satisfactory nature.

Last year's crops in the districts surrounding us were not as abundant as it was generally expected they would be.

Our waterworks system is now an accomplished fact, which is a matter for sincere congratulation.

Building matters generally are progressing, the new Post Office and Custom House building is now under way.

The Board has demonstrated its usefulness to the town during the past year, a larger membership is, however, desirable.

Your attention is drawn to the ill-considered pamphlet about being issued under the auspices of the Board.

We would again urge the necessity of the Board, acting with the Town Council, to take measures for the securing of a Summer Hotel in the town.

The Board having been notified that it was the intention of the Government to re-impose the harbor tolls.

The committee reports were as follows: COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE.

Goderich, Feb. 26th, 1889. Your Committee on Agriculture have to report that crops in this neighborhood the past year were below the average.

The North Western Exhibition, though run on a liberal basis, was not as well patronized as its merits demanded.

Your committee at the last annual meeting recommended that all grain should be sold on the market.

The activity in the shipyard has not abated. A large schooner is now under construction for Mr. Joseph Williams.

We would recommend this board to put forth every effort to oppose the imposition of harbor tolls upon shipments or receipts at this port.
