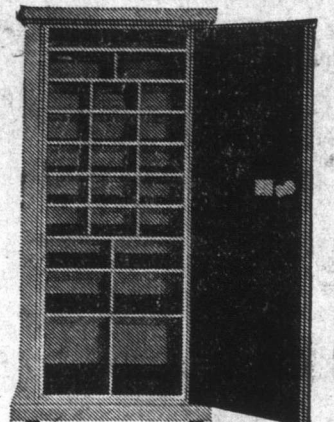

Special Evening Telegram.  
BERLIN, July 10.

Preliminary negotiations regarding Morocco are being conducted behind closed doors. Nothing has been made public beyond the joint statement that a friendly feeling exists, and that expenses would be equally borne. It is expected the negotiations will be prolonged during the first stage, but without sensational developments. The last negotiations were confined to Germany and France, though the Powers interested were kept informed.

LONDON, July 10.

The Times in an editorial to-day on the Anglo-American Arbitration, expresses the opinion that the present would be the opportune moment for Bryan to open negotiations with Japan, with a view to modifying the Anglo-Japanese alliance so as to bring about harmony with the Anglo-American treaty. The Times believes that, in any case, no difficulty is likely to arise whether with Japan or the States.

The steamer, with a cargo of 154 tons of ammunition, was confiscated.
