3,000 War Medals.

Relics of Famous Fighters to be Sold.

A remarkable collection of nearly 3,000 medals, won by officers and men in the various wars of British history, is to be sold in the near future, unless it is saved for the nation either by a government grant or by a public subscription.

The collection has been acquired during the last thirty years by Dr. A. A. Payne, of Sheffield, and is now housed in the Nappin Art Gallery in that city. Over five hundred of the medals were awarded to officers of all ranks, and many were won by members of the peerage; some of them belonged to the House of Guelph. Every regiment present at Waterloo is represented as are also the German Legion, and the Hanoverian and the Brunswick
