**CATALINA  
ABLAZE WITH  
ENTHUSIASM.**

**Endorses Coalition-- Will give  
vote for Opposition team.**

CATALINA, To-Day.  
The Opposition candidates  
were given a grand reception  
here last night, the whole town  
turning out to welcome them.  
Four hundred people with 150 lit  
torches gave a big demonstra-  
tion, which passed under a mag-  
nificent illuminated arch, with  
band playing lively airs, Dr. Mc-  
Kay in a carriage heading the  
procession to the hall, which was  
packed to overflowing, while hun-  
dreds were unable to get in. Mr.  
White was Chairman. The coali-  
tion under Sir Robert Bond was  
enthusiastically endorsed. Mr.  
Stone spoke eloquently for half  
an hour, receiving much ap-  
plause. Mr. Coaker, who had an  
enthusiastic welcome, dwelt  
much on the value of the coal-

ition and the eminent services be-  
ing rendered by Sir Robert Bond.  
His glowing speech was punctu-  
ated by much applause. At the  
close he asked all who intended  
to vote straight ticket for Lloyd,  
Stone and Targett to stand. It  
is said only one remained in his  
seat. Dr. Lloyd was given a  
great welcome. He spoke for an  
hour and a half on Liberalism  
and Unionism, Sir Robert Bond  
and Mr. Coaker, and remarked  
on the wholehearted endorse-  
ment of the coalition and the  
leadership of Sir Robert Bond.  
The meeting closed at midnight  
amid ringing cheers for Coali-  
tion Candidates. The Govern-  
ment is down and out here, their  
candidates will get but a score  
or so votes. Catalina is solid for  
the Opposition.
