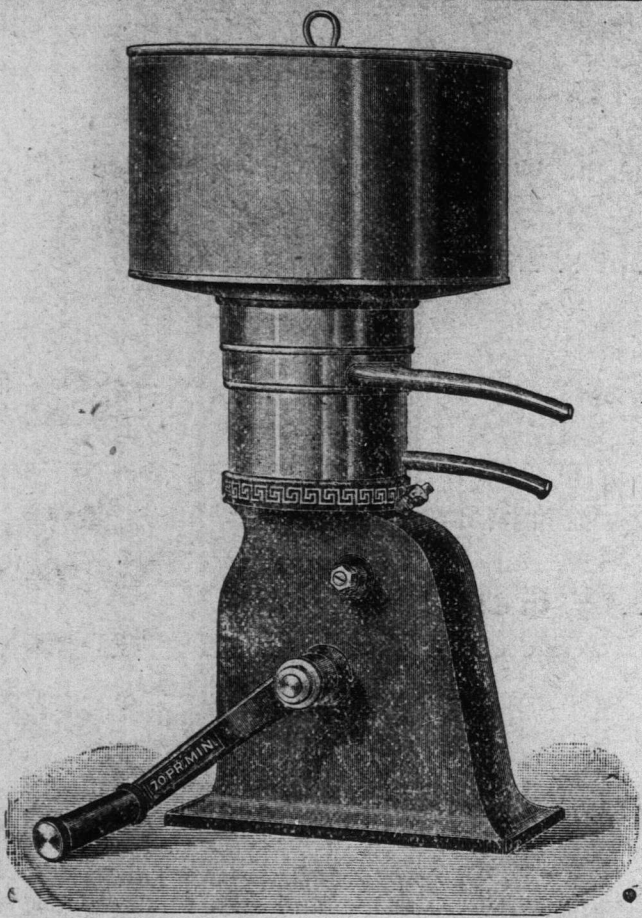

SITUATION UNCHANGED.

PARIS, To-Day.
Official to-night says the situation is without modification.

BAVARIAN KING'S AWAKENING.

AMSTERDAM, To-Day.
King Ludwig of Bavaria, on reviewing the Cadets of Munich Bay to-day, according to the Lokal Anzeiger, Berlin, says the war will last a long time, but we shall not rest until the enemy is beaten off the battlefield and until a place is secured that will protect us for a long time against attack.

DESTRUCTION IN DARDANELLES.

LONDON, To-Day.
A despatch from Athens says the Turks lost 250 men and two guns, destroyed in the bombardment of the forts of the Dardanelles. The former German cruisers Goeben and Breslau, which are now flying the Turkish flag, have re-entered the Bosphorus.

MONUMENT TO LORD ROBERTS.

LONDON, To-Day.
In order that no time should be lost in providing a suitable memorial for Lord Roberts, Premier Asquith will move in the Commons that an address be presented to King George, asking the King's directions that a monument be erected at public cost with an inscription on it, expressing the admiration of this House for his illustrious military career and its gratitude for his devoted services to the State.

LONDON, To-Day.
The greatest single demand made upon the material resources of Britain was voiced by Premier Asquith yesterday afternoon when in the Commons he moved an additional credit for war purposes of \$1,125,000,000, which in addition to the millions already voted in August is equivalent to an increase of more than 50 per cent to the national debt. The Premier told the House that the largest portion of the first £100,000,000 had already been expended in the conduct of military operations, loans to allies, disbursements for securing food supplies for this country, expenditure for sugar, which has been especially large and would, in the belief of the Premier, ultimately be recouped by the Exchequer. A considerable sum will be spent to secure the control of the railroads. The Government's expenditure included provisions for refugees. With regard to the purposes of the new credit, by far the greater bulk of this would be for army and navy expenditure. The Premier said the civil expenditures would be inconceivable. They would be largely for the purpose of securing food supplies and for further commodities necessary for British use which must be made impossible for the enemy. Another large item was made up in loans of money to others, amounting to £43,000,000. The principal item in this list would be to the Belgian Government, £10,000,000, and Serbia £800,000, on which no interest was to be charged until the end of the war. Other loans to self-governing Dominions—Canada, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, countries which under ordinary circumstances would be compelled to borrow in the London market—would account for £30,250,000 of the new credit, for the reason that the Govt. had undertaken the responsibility of raising loans for these Dominions. Regarding the cost of the war, Asquith said he declined to delve into the future or speculate what commitments it might be necessary for Britain later, but up to last Saturday the actual expenditure falling upon the Exchequer amounted to between £900,000 and £1,000,000 a day. Having regard to the enormous scale of the operations and other considerations, this sum, the Premier said, did not exceed the estimates of expenditure that might reasonably have been expected. Continuing, the Premier said he would hold out no hope that these expenditures would likely be diminished. The present measure carries the provisions to March 31st, which would not only satisfy the calculations, based on experience, but would leave in hand a reasonable margin. Walter Long congratulated the Premier on the evident determination of the Government to carry through the great war and leave nothing undone to make the issue the only one Britain could contemplate, that is to say successful. The Government could count on the widest latitude and absolutely on a free hand. Long said as long as the country is satisfied it would prosecute the war with vigor and determination. Replying to the criticism of the news raised in the course of debate, Asquith declared nothing had been kept back except in cases where such a course was required by immediate military exigencies. Touching on other points raised in the course of debate, Asquith said increased exports to neutral countries were in most cases due to the fact that the supply to these countries from Germany had been cut off rather than to the fact that goods were being re-exported by those countries to Germany. Dealing with the vote of a million additional men, the Premier remarked that apart from the territorialials 1,100,000 men were already under arms. That number, however, he added was not enough. He said he saw no reason to be discouraged by the recruiting figures. The number of men of the exigencies of the country demanded, he believed, would be raised. Indeed he considered the recruiting position was very satisfactory. Since the outbreak, Asquith said, more than 700,000 recruits had joined the regular army and nearly 300,000 had joined the territorialials. The votes for the additional war credit of \$1,125,000,000 and the additional £100,000,000 men were immediately agreed upon.
